Umpire Quigley is Seriously Injured by Gas Explosion

CHICAGO, Aug. 9.—Umpire E. C. Quigiey was seriously injured this after-noon by an explosion of gas in the stove of the ticket office at the National League park. He was inflating his breast protector when the socident oc-curred. He was badly burned and was taken unconscious to a nearby hospital. Half an hour after the accident the umpire was still unconscious, but physicians said there was nothing to indicate that his injuries affected any vital organ and that probably he would recover.

Gilmore Puts Ban On the Mud Ball

CHICAGO, Aug. 5.—Use of the "mud ball," successor to the emery ball, was prohibited in the Federal league on orprohibited in the Federal league on orders issued today from Fresident Glimore's office here. A penalty of \$50 is provided for violation of the order.

In addition, a ruling that the umpires must rub the gloss off all new balls before putting them in play is included, and the use of a sponge, wet handkerchief or other article to aid in moistening the balls is also interdicted.

Credit for discovering the must ball has been given to 22 Reulbach of the Newark Federals, who is said to have used it successfully in a game against Chicago a few days ago. A little lump of wet sand stuck on the ball caused it to take a peculiar course, something after the feshion of the emery ball.


