BERLIN, Aug. 10.—(By Wireless to Sayville.)—The following was given out today by the Overseas News Agency: "The Vossische Zeitung and the Berner Tageblatt comment at length on the latest official publication of Beigian diplomatic reports found in Brussels They say these documents prove conclusively that England prepared systematically for the great European war by drawmeshes of the diplomatic and political net about Germany, frustrating all attempts of the German government to unscrupulous criminal, which plunged the world into a carefully prepared war for the most selfish motives—envy and fear. "The Vossische Zeitung says that the normal responsibility for the colossal slaughter rests almost entirely upon Eng-land's shoulders."

Asks Deeds Set Aside. Mrs. Margaret Pratt Olson of Ostergotland, Sweden, daughter of the late Colonel James H. Pratt of Omaha and heir to a half interest in the estate, yesterday naked the district court to set aside deeds by which she had granted her interest Summer Hill farm at Benson and a large tract of land in Wyoming to Jerome P. Mages of Omaha.

Her Interest in Summer Hill farm, Mrs. Otson alleges, is worth \$100,000 and her equity in the Wyoming land is valued at an equal sum. She sold her interest in the properties, the petition alleges, at a price of \$40,000, of which, it mays, she received \$15,000 cash and the remainder in securities still in the possession of Jerome P. Magee.

Jerome P. Magee is a nephew of Mrs Olson. His mother, Mrs. Henry W. Magee, and Mrs. Otson were heirs to the Connected Free. estate of Colonel Pratt. The petition asserts that Mrs. Olson in making the sale of her interest in the estate relied on the fact that Jerome P. Magee was her relative and was her attorney. She received no information concerning the value of her equities except the representations made by him, she alleges. The sale was made when Jerome P. Magee visited his aunt at her home in sweden.
