Mrs. Charles Strieby, Found Living Under Assumed Name by Husband, Attempts Suicide.

FOLLOWED THE "TIP" OF FRIEND

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Aug. 14 .- (Special Telegram.) -Mrs. Nellie Strieby, 21 years old, a manicurist in Chicago until her marriage last January to Charles M. Strieby of Omaha, well Motor Car company, tried to end her life by drinking polson in the bathroom of her apartments at the Warwick hotel at 3 o'clock this morning. She died at the City hos-

Her husband and her married sister. Mrs. Francis Milbourn, were beld following the attempted suicide, but were released on bond.

Strieby reluctantly said he and his wife quarreled after he came here on a "tip" from a friend to find that his wife had been living at a hotel since August 4 under an assumed name.

A conference was held in his hotel room and it was secided to begin life anew. As his wife and her sister were preparing to leave the room, Mrs. Strieby

"Won't you kiss me good night?" He answered, "No, I don't believe I can. I must have time to think the matter

Immediately after she reached her room Mrs. Strieby drank the poison. At the City hospital Mrs. Strieby, after receiving the last sacraments of the Catholic church, recognized Strieby. Her husband held her hand and she tried to speak to him once. They appeared to be
