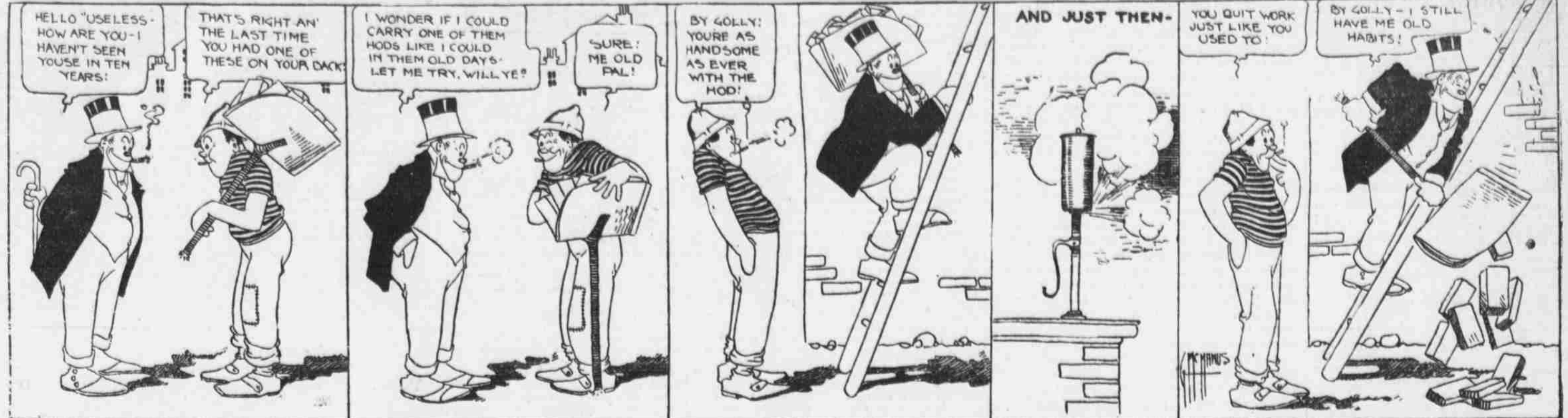

BEARS BREAK UP WINNING STREAK

Make Counting Run When Everdon Balks and Shestak Scores McCormick.

WARFARE BITTER ALL THROUGH

DENVER, Colo., Aug. 27.—(Special Telegram.)—Knotting the score in the eighth, Denver finally broke through the Omaha trenches this afternoon, in the final game of the series, when, with two down and one man on base, Shestak delivered a clean hit to center, scoring McCormick. The final score was 5 to 4.

Pitcher Ingersoll was very nearly responsible for a third Rourke victory. Held to two hits through four innings, the visitors rallied in the fifth. With one out Krumpholtz and McCormick skied. Tannhill put over a long hit to right, which was good for two bases. Krumpholtz took two strikes then chopped at one a mile high. He connected and the ball went whirling into center field for a triple, scoring three runs. Smith followed with a single, which brought Ingersoll the rest of the way.

Bears Begin to Hit.

The Bears had taken one run in the third on a walk to Coffey, an infield out and Miller's double and they were not to be cheated out of the battle by one rally. In their half of the fifth Shields opened with a smashing double and Coffey followed with a triple, which scored the first man. Ingersoll went to the bench without further delay and Everdon was called in. Shestak's fielding out scored Jack.

In the seventh Shields opened with a single and went to third on a sacrifice and infield out. Spahr was sent in to bat for Gaskell, but could not deliver.

The tying run was due to Miller's hit, Kelleher's sacrifice and a collision. The last occurred when Spencer hit to Everdon, who relayed to Schleibner.

Schleibner Bites Dust.

The first baseman failed to get out to the base line and Spencer hit to head-on, sending him sprawling. Miller had gone on to third on the hit and when Schleibner bit the dust he went the rest of the way.

Denver won when McCormick singled, Shields sacrificed and Everdon committed that rare article, a balk. Shestak scored the run.
