NEW YORK, Sept. 3-Dun's Review tomorrow will say: Restraint upon now enterprises slackens as international diplomatic relations improve, but the derangement of foreign exchange continues a disturbing element in financial and export circles. Depression of European funds in this market has reached the stage where interference with overses trade is threatened, although no actual check to merchandise shipments has thus far occurred. Important problems, however, are diminishing in number and three is a growing belief that current business progress will not be seriously impeded. Even the notable revival or activity in some directions is less impressive than the general restoration of confidence, without which a return to full prosperity would not be possible. Virtual assurances of big grain crops and knowledge that the purchasing power of the people was never greater than at present are two of several reasons why optimism has become a national characteristic. Any long range view of the situation leads to sanguine conclusions and, though complete absence of complaint is not to be expected, underlying conditions are no sound that real pessimism is no longer warranted. Sustained improvement is the keynote of advices from practically all leading centers and in the few instances where concrete betterment is lacking a spirit of hopefulness is plainly manifest that the advent of fall will be accompanied by further expansion is everywhere anticipated.
