FAIR SOCIETY HAS **GREAT RACE PLANS**

Secures Columbia Fire and Hal Mo-Kinney and Announces Large Entry List.

TWO PACERS IN FAST CONTESTS

By G. K. MURRAY.

Announcement that Columbia Fire, 3:04%, and Hal McKinney, 2:05%, had been secured for another match race for the county fair association's race meeting next week, rivalled in interest to local horsemen during the last few days the publication of the splendid entry list secured by the association.

These two horses which for half a dozen races this season have been fighting desperately to secure a settlement of their respective claims to mastership, will contest in Omaha for a purse of \$1,100, of which \$600 will be provided by the fair society. The winner is to take the whole purse. The race will be held one week from next Wednesday.

At the August meeting of the Omaha Driving club Columbia Fire beat Hal Mo-Kinney in a five-heat race over a soft track, winning the last three heats. But College Gent was at the throatlatch of the winning horse in every heat and was a considerable factor in determining the result. In addition Hal McKinney does better on a hard track.

In the match race at the State fair last week Hal McKinney beat Columbia. Fire, pacing the last heat of the race in 2:07% and tying the three-heat record for Nebraska made by himself when he beat Columbia Fire at Wahoo the last week in July.

The Dispute at Lincoln.

The judges thought that Bob Sebastian was not trying with Hal the first heat and they put up Allen who drove the remainder of the race. The judges called off the first heat, which was won by Columbia Fire, making the race in 2:15, in effect a four-heat affair. Sebastian said he had a hopple strap down and a boot off and didn't want to take chances of injuring the horse or breaking his own neck.

Omaha horsemen who saw the race thought the first heat was honest Be that as it may, the horses went on and put up a terrific race. At any rate E. G. Bohanon is not generally believed to be a fellow who would pay another horse anything to let Columbia Fire win when that redoubtable steed is in form to drive his opponent out in \$2:08%, 2:09 and 3:07% as he did at Lincoln.

It has been the history of all racing that a slow heat in a widely advertised match race causes charges of "fixing." even th ugh the men accused are the most reputable in the business. Yet slow heats are often seen in purse and stake ruces when there are several horses which fail to get squared away instead of only two. In the case of Hal Mc-Kinney it would be poor policy for him to force the race, since his game is to come from behind and outbrush his opponent in the stretch.

It's an Even Break.

The best tip on this race to date is that it is as near an even break as a horse race ever gets to be, unless track conditions or loss of form on the part of one of the horses should alter the situation.
