If my experience counts for anything I certainly think that the Boston Symphony orchestra will draw one of the greatest audiences that ever thronged the Auditorium. The immense enthusiasm everywhere over the coming of what is undoubtedly the world's greatest orchestra, combined with the fact that this performance will be one of the big features of Ak-Sar-Ben week, will pack our new municipal Auditorium to the furthest corner.

The bringing of such an organization to Omaha could scarcely be undertaken by one person, for the cost is too great to be assumed by one man, no matter how public-spirited he may be. So it remained for the Omaha "Retailers" to promote and finance this great concert.

Just for a minute, contemplate the railroad fares, 100 berth and drawing-room accommodations, a solid vestibuled Pullman train with four baggage cars, as well as the immense salaries of the individual artists, to say nothing of the local expense, such as printed matter, bill-posting, advertising and Auditorium rent. One can then begin to see up the probable cost of such an undertaking. The committee in charge, Messrs. Belden, Nash and Brandels, have held almost daily conference with the local manager. Their time alone in this work, while not included in the expenses, would be an item for which few would care to pay.

Franke, care of the Omaha Auditorium, and I cannot too strongly advise everyone to get immediate action. Every seat will certainly be sold. You yourself will go. So why not get a good seat, instead of taking what is left at some later date?
