Bostons Make Their Lead Over Four Games as They Win Before Record Throng.

THREE TO TWO IS THE SCORE

BOSTON, Sept. 20 .- Turning the Detroit Tigers back for the third time today, to 2, the Boston Red Sox went into the lead of more than four games in the American league race. Detreit's pennant prospects were thus dimmed before a crowd which brought the total paid attendance for the feur-game series to 107,423, believed to be a record for any but world title contests.
