LONDON, Sept. 26.—The Amsterdam correspondent of the Reuters Telegram company says the Handeleblad's correspondent on the island of Cadzand, province of Zeeland, Holland, sends the following account of the bombardment of Zebrugge, Belgium, by a British squadron: "An English squadron consisting of five large warships and twenty-five smaller vessels opened fire on Zebrugge at 6:30 o'clock in the morning. Only two of the big ships fired from what apparently were twenty-eight-centimeter guns. The German batteries replied with lighter guns, but not until 10 o'clock."
