WHALES LOSE HOPE AS REBS TRIUMPH

Pittsburgh Retains Lead, but Terriers Seem to Have Best Show for Pennant.

ST. LOUIS BEATS KANSAS CITY

CHICAGO, Sept. 30.—Chicago today all but bade good-bye to the Federal league pennant by losing to Pittsburgh, which thereby strengthened its hold on the lead in the close race, while St. Louis resumed second place by defeating Kansas City again.

To win the championship Chicago would have to win all the four remaining games it has to play, as they are all with Pittsburgh.

St. Louis tonight still seemed to its supporters to have the best chance for the flag, as it has only two games to play and has one more victory to its credit than the leader, which has to play its four remaining games with Chicago.

In order to win, however, St. Louis would have to win both its games, while Pittsburgh lost half of its four, or take one game while the Rebels lost three.

As both pennants in the other two leagues involving the east and the west have gone to the east, the Pittsburgh team might handily make the collection unanimous for that region by winning three of its remaining games, or only two, if Kansas City should lose one.

Rebels Retain Lead.

PITTSBURGH, Sept. 30.—Pittsburgh retained its lead in the Federal league race today by defeating Chicago in a hard-fought game, 5 to 4.

The Whales started in the first inning when Plack hit to center for a home run. Another tally was made in the third inning on hits by Zedler and Fischer and a base on balls.

YORK, Neb., Sept. 30.—(Special Telegram)—Omaha lost to York college today, 26 to 0. A wet field and drizzling rain made fast playing difficult. York scored three touchdowns on forward passes, but made little headway on line plunges. The visitors gave promise of scoring the first quarter, but lost on fumbles.

Omaha had the York team on their thirty-yard line several times, but could not advance further. Brewer, left end for York, played a stellar game. Stoner, right halfback also showed up well, making a spectacular run of fifty yards for a touchdown on an intercepted pass.

For Omaha Seibert showed up well. The sticky tackle broke up many of the York plays and on the offensive had little trouble in opening up holes.
