LINCOLN, Oct. 2 -(Special Telegram.) -Coach Stiehm's Huskers inaugurated the 1915 foot ball season here this afternoon against a Missouri Valley conference opponent by trouncing Drake, 48 to 13. Griffith's pupils earned one touchdown by pounding the Nebraska line for steady and consistent gains. Captain Blackburn boosted his team's total to thirteen after he had scooped up a forward pass, which Warnock fumbled, and with a clear field in front of him scooted twenty-five yards across the Husker goal

Nebraska's backfield put up a danzling exhibition of foot ball, with Chamberlain playing his usual brilliantly flashing

Suha Put in Action. In the second half Stiehm tried out a number of second string men and they played better ball than those who first started the game. Little Cajey, who replaced Cook at quarterback at the end of the first half, shared with Chamberlain and Rutherford the honors of the day. Caley electrified the stands with a stunning forty-five-yard return of a kickoff on the first play and in returning punts. His handling of the forward pass

The Nebraska backfield played midseason foot ball, but the line, which has been Stishm's worry, showed fatal weaknesses and allowed Drake to pile up more points than any Drake eleven has ever scored against a Nebraska team. Bunz, the big Drake halfback, and Captain Blackburn found it easy to slip through for substantial gains.




