March 15, 1885, the club held its first annual hunt under the captains, Fred Hoye, Lee Bridges and Tom Collopy, All returned without game, owing to the weather. The organization continued until the fall

Until they agree to meet Weinert neither Moran nor Coffey can claim recognition as the most formidable pponent for the champion. This statement, I think, will be concurred in by
