WORKS GOOD CRAFT IN HOUSE NUMBERS

Man Sells Metal Numerals to Residents of South Side at Exorbitant Prices.

CARRIES CITY CREDENTIALS

The methods of a man furnishing new house numbers and selling metal numerals for the same to South Side residents have been questioned by a citizen who made inquiry at the city engineer's office. The complainant reported that his wife paid 80 cents for four numerals which he could duplicate at an Omaha retail store for 15 cents per numeral.

He stated that the man who called on his wife led her to believe he was an accredited representative of the city, although he may not have said so in exact words.

Recently the city council changed the numbers of houses on South Side streets running north and south so that these numbers would run consecutively from Dodge street to the extreme south limits, thus necessitating many changes in house numbers.

The man who is calling at South Side houses carrying slips bearing serial numbers and issued by the city engineering department. Each slip is signed "John A. Bruce, city engineer, by H. S. Burns," the former signature being impressed by a rubber stamp. The slip is a certificate of the new number for the lot designated by description.

City Engineer Bruce contends he had no knowledge of the issuance of these slips with his signature and knows nothing of the operations of this man.

In the absence of Commissioner Jardine, who is ill, Assistant City Engineer Townsend made this statement: "This man is not employed by the city, but we gave him these slips with the new numbers, the understanding being he would distribute the numbers and thus save us that work or save householders the trouble of calling here for their new numbers. We understand he would try to make sales of metal numerals, but there was no understanding as to what he could charge. He could charge \$1 a number if he wanted to. Commissioner Jardine authorized this department to give him the slips with the numbers. The man is not in our employ in any manner."

At the time the man called on Commissioner Jardine to inquire if there would be any objection to his plan, the commissioner said: "You can sell them the blue sky if you wish."

The work of furnishing the new numbers to South Side houses rightfully belongs in the city engineering department. Engineer Bruce expressed surprise when told that this man was distributing these slips bearing his signature.

TO FILE COMPLAINT FOR BREAKING 8 O'CLOCK LAW

Mrs. Cole Goes to Suffragists After Long Consideration

Local suffragists are rejoicing over the "conversion" of Mrs. F. H. Cole, Omaha's prominent club woman. Mrs. Cole is also general chairman of the civil service reform committee of the General Federation of Women's clubs and the suffragists considered it would be quite a feather in their cap if they could secure her support.

Mrs. Cole wasn't an out and out anti-suffragist, but she didn't join the suffrage society, anyway.

Came Richard Henry Dana, head of the national civil service reform organization, and he said: "Mrs. Cole, I think you could do far better work if you were a suffragist," but Mrs. Cole was unconvinced.

While pursuing her investigations along civil service lines Mrs. Cole learned that women were being discriminated against for appointments to various governmental positions, as, for instance, immigration inspectors, even if they passed the examinations with as high percentages as the men.

Whereupon Mrs. Cole sent in her application for membership to two suffrage organizations, the Equal Franchise and the Political Equality leagues.

When Mrs. Cole mentioned this fact at the recent state federation meeting the clubwomen applauded vociferously.

Today Mrs. Cole is rejoicing over a telegram received from Joseph J. O'Reilly, president of the Civil Service Forum, now holding a convention in New York City, that the convention had endorsed suffrage.
