### ALLIES BUYING ALL IN TRUST FASHION

Not Dollar's Worth of War Supplies Purchased in U. S., but Committee Gives 0. K.

### COMPETITION GUARDED AGAINST

NEW YORK, Oct. 16.—Of the millions of dollars spent daily in this country by the allies for war supplies, not a dollar, it was learned authoritatively today, can be spent without the official sanction of the British government, obtained from a committee sitting in London. Although the committee has been in operation for many months, its existence has not heretofore been generally known outside of governmental circles. Only once, so far as can

be learned—and then in the case of Russia—has the mandate of this body been disregarded.

Personnel Not Published. The personnel of this committee has never been published and probably never will be. It consists, however, of representatives of each of the allied nations from Great Britain to Montenegro, controls absolutely the purchase of all war supplies in any foreign country as a financial check and supervisor over all the war chests of all the allies, and seeks to eliminate competitive bidding.

### Can Prevent Competition.

Under its guidance the allies can refrain from a competition which, if permitted, would send prices to prohibitive levels and swell the cost of conducting the war. Instead of coming into the American market when supplies are needed and waging a financial contest for them, the allies have adopted a system of placing one big order at a time in this country. When the contract for this order is signed, the next nation's needs are taken up and another contract is placed. This is maintained until all are cared for. The committee's scope extends to supplies.
