War Draws from Teachers' Ranks in Dominion of Canada

DES MOINES, Ia., Oct. 18 .- (Special Telegram.)-The world war has orippled the schools and colleges of Canada as to the faculties tremendously, according to Prof. F. W. Snow, the new instructor in romance languages at the University of Iowa. Prof. Snow has just recently come to lows from Toronto. He says that troops are drilling on nearly every Canadian campus and school work is secondary to military training, while professors and instructors are flocking to the front. More than 33% per cent of the educators have enlisted, he says.

Wheat in Millions of Bushels Moving Through U.S. Ports

NEW YORK, Oct. 18.-The largest movement of Canadian wheat through the United States ever recorded is now going on through this port. Records of the produce exchange compiled to and including Friday, October 17, show that 4,265,79t bushels have been brought here from Canada since the early part of August and reloaded on steamships for shipment, mainly to England, France and Italy. This wheat, in order to avoid the payment of a duty of 10 cents per bushel, comes through in bond.

The Canadian wheat crop, estimated by grain men for this season at approximately \$23,000,000 bushels, is one of the largest in the history of the dominion and compares with 256,000,000 bushels raised last year.

The total export wheat movement through New York from August 1 to October 15 is placed at 12,111,525 bushels, of which 7,845,734 bushels were grown in the United States.

Grain men say they expect the heavy export movement will continue through the entire season, or until about January 1, when the Argentine crop is available.
