

OVER HALF BILLION DOLLARS FOR NAVY

Official Estimates of Money to Be Spent in Next Five Years Made Public.

TEN DREADNAUGHTS PLANNED

WASHINGTON, Oct. 19.—Official estimates of the navy's part in the administration's billion-dollar national defense program were made public tonight by Secretary Daniels.

The five-year building program contemplates construction of ten dreadnaughts, six battle cruisers, ten scout cruisers, fifty destroyers, fifteen seagoing submarines, eighty-five coast defense submarines, four gunboats, one hospital ship, two ammunition ships, two fuel oil ships and one repair ship.

Money for Aviation. On naval aviation it is proposed to expend \$20,000,000 during the five years, and on reserve munitions \$5,000,000.

Secretary Daniels will recommend this winter the addition to the navy of 7,500 bluejackets, 2,500 apprentices and 1,400 marines, a total of 11,400 men.

To officer the additional force of marines the secretary will recommend appointment of two brigadier colonels, two lieutenant colonels, six majors, one colonel, an assistant quartermaster, fourteen captains, fourteen first lieutenants, thirteen second lieutenants and twenty-two warrant officers.

Will Have More Midships. Additional naval officers will be obtained by increasing the number of midshipmen at the academy at Annapolis by not less than 500 men.

For the aviation corps Secretary Daniels will recommend a special service of which civilian aviators can be appointed. The 1917 naval estimates to be presented to congress this winter will total \$217,000,000, an increase of \$27,000,000 over last year's appropriation.

Program Year by Year. The building program for the five-year period is as follows:

For 1915 (authorized in 1915)—Two dreadnaughts, \$15,000,000; two battle cruisers, \$11,100,000; three scout cruisers, \$6,000,000; fifteen destroyers, \$25,500,000; ten submarines, \$4,450,000; twenty-five coast submarines, \$1,700,000; gunboats, \$700,000; one hospital ship, \$1,000,000; two ammunition ships, \$2,700,000; one fuel oil ship, \$2,000,000. Total, \$67,850,000.

For 1916—Two dreadnaughts, \$25,800,000; continuing work on two battle cruisers, \$11,500,000; one scout cruiser, \$6,500,000; ten destroyers, \$25,500,000; four fleet submarines, \$2,000,000; fifteen coast submarines, \$1,700,000; one gunboat, \$700,000; one hospital ship, \$1,000,000; continuing work on ammunition ships, \$2,700,000; continuing work on fuel oil ship, \$2,000,000. Total, \$82,700,000.

For 1917—Two dreadnaughts, \$27,000,000; one battle cruiser, \$17,000,000; two scout cruisers, \$10,000,000; five destroyers, \$21,000,000; two fleet submarines, \$1,000,000; ten coast submarines, \$5,000,000; one gunboat, \$700,000; one ammunition ship, \$1,000,000; continuing work on fuel oil ship, \$2,000,000; continuing work on ammunition ships, \$2,700,000. Total, \$102,300,000.

Cost of Each Dreadnaught. It is estimated that each dreadnaught will cost, including armor and armament, \$15,000,000. The total cost of each of the other types of vessels recommended is as follows:

Battle cruisers, \$17,000,000; Scout cruisers, \$10,000,000; Destroyer, \$1,800,000; Fleet submarine, \$1,000,000; Coast submarine, \$500,000; Gunboats, \$700,000; Hospital ship, \$1,000,000; Fuel oil ship, \$2,000,000; Repair ship, \$2,000,000.

TEUTON ARMIES MOVING SOUTH FROM BELGRADE

Three Atakets Reported. PARIS, Oct. 19.—Three German attacks with hand grenades last night to the northeast of Soches were completely repulsed by the French forces, according to the official French statement given out by the war office this afternoon.

German forces last night delivered three "bombs" attacks, making use of hand grenades, in the Bois-de-Hache, to the northeast of Soches. Our infantry, firmly entrenched in the position recently conquered by us, completely repulsed their assaults. In this they were helped by our batteries.

Reason for Engaging in War. NAPLES, Oct. 18.—(Via Rome.)—Travelers from the near east, just returned here on the steamer Romania, and interviewed by the Roma, assert that the real purpose of the present struggle in the Balkans is not to prevent the sending of munitions and food to Constantinople, but to keep the central powers from cutting off the supply of munitions sent to Russia by her allies over the Saloniki-Nish railroad.

Heavy Losses Reported. PARIS, Oct. 19.—Heavy losses for the Bulgarians in the fighting which preceded the capture by the allies of Strumitsa is reported in a dispatch from Saloniki to Milan, as forwarded to the Havas News agency. It is asserted that entire battalions of Bulgarians were annihilated by the Franco-Serbian forces.

Austrians Are Advancing. BERLIN, Oct. 19.—The Austrian army invading Serbia over the Save front along the northwest border apparently has its movement well under way, after meeting with determined opposition from the Serbian army headquarters today announced capture of the town of Obrenovatz. South of Belgrade on the Danube front, the Austrians have made a further advance. The troops of General von Gallwitz have occupied several points of strategic importance.

Serbs Seek to Occupy Widin. MILAN, Oct. 19.—The correspondent of the Secolo, at Bucharest, telegraphs that the Serbians are striving to occupy Widin to prevent the Germans from establishing communication with the Bulgarians by the Lem-Palanka route. The Serbian army is seeking to envelop the Bulgarian troops operating in the direction of the Timok river.

BANK IN TOWN NEAR SEATTLE IS ROBBED

SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 19.—Two men robbed the Citizens' bank of Renton, six miles from here, today and escaped with about \$2,500 in currency. They fled toward Seattle in an automobile, shooting at its rear.

ALLIES IN SERIOUS CASE ON PENINSULA

All Ground They Hold is that Commanded by Guns of Their Warships. SUFFERING AMONG SOLDIERS

The following letter from an Associated Press correspondent at the Dardanelles front is of interest in view of the assertion of Lord Milner in the House of Lords last week that the British campaign on the Gallipoli peninsula had been a failure. There have been no changes of great importance since the letter was written.

CONSTANTINOPLE Sept. 1.—The position of the allied troops on the Anafarta-Ari-Burnu front of the Gallipoli peninsula can hardly be described as a promising one. Such at least was the impression gained by The Associated Press correspondent during an eight days' stay in the war arena in question.

Result of Four Actions. What is perhaps of more importance is the result of four major military actions which occurred while the correspondent was on this front. They consisted of an attack by the allies on a Turkish position north of Kodjatchemen Dagh on the afternoon of August 20, an assault on Turkish trenches in the same general locality on the same night and two attacks on Anafarta on August 26 and 27.

Advantage with Turks. Every advantage of terrain is held by the Turks, whose trenches are located on higher ground than those of the allies. With important positions lost the allies today hold themselves in the Anafarta region solely by virtue of an immense artillery fire superiority.

These have been momentous, however, when the Turkish troops in the Anafarta district have been hard pressed. An attack made by the allies on August 26 and 27 in the direction of Kiretch Teped ended in terrible slaughters of British troops, some 3,800 dead being counted on August 27.

What Soldier Eats. Up to a week ago the food of the British soldier consisted of six army biscuits, a preserved meat ration, some candy and jam. Poor health is the result of this diet.

Other handicaps of the allied troops must be added the great heat and ever present dust. It cannot be said that the troops recently brought to the peninsula are first-class material.

Insane Three Weeks. When the Associated Press correspondent left the Gallipoli peninsula after an eight-day stay on the front, the allied troops at Seddul Bahr, on the tip of the peninsula, had been inactive for more than three weeks. Their position was no more favorable than that of their comrades in the Anafarta region.

Field Marshal Liman von Sanders, the German officer in command of the Turkish forces, gave his idea of the general situation as follows: "I am too old to be an optimist, but I believe—I am absolutely confident—that unless something extraordinary occurs, we shall hold the allies where they are."

As far as concerns the allied forces at Seddul Bahr, it is next to impossible for them to advance, with operations conducted within the range of reasonable and permissible sacrifices of men. In other words, it is still possible to dislodge the Turks, but to do so would cause too great a loss to the allies.

Turks Take No Chances. El Jid Tepe, in the Seddul Bahr region, has been the objective of the allies.

MEXICANS ATTACK PASSENGER TRAIN

Three Killed and Five Wounded Following Robbery on Texas Road by Bandits from Mexico.

BROWNSVILLE, Tex., Oct. 19.—Inspired by race hatred as well as desire for loot, twenty Mexicans who claimed to be followers of Luis De La Rosa, leader of the so-called Texas revolution, held up and robbed a train near Omito, seven miles north of here, late last night.

The dead: CORPORAL M'CARRE, Third United States cavalry, shot; ENGINEER H. H. KENDALL, pinned UNIDENTIFIED YOUNG MEXICAN, (passenger), shot by Americans for aiding robbers.

The probably fatally injured are: Dr. E. S. McCrain, deputy state health officer at Brownsville, shot in abdomen; Injured: Harry J. Wallis, Brownsville, shot in arm; R. Woodhall, fireman, scalded and bruised; Claude J. Brishner, Troop A, Sixth cavalry, shot in the jaw; C. H. Layman, Troop D, Third cavalry, shot in neck and leg; Pizano was a co-leader with De la Rosa.
