NOTRE DAME NOT QUITE SO HEAVY

Coach Harper Says Weight of Men on His Team Has Been Much Overestimated.

SQUAD READY FOR BIG BATTLE

LINCOLN, Oct. 22.—(Special.)—Coach Jess Harper and Assistant Coach Rooken steamed into Lincoln this morning with a squad of twenty-two husky foot ball warriors, representing the hope of the Notre Dame university on the gridiron. Harper went into quarters at the Lincoln hotel. The Notre Dame coach vigorously protested against the misrepresentation of weights of his squad. He claimed the Cornhuskers would outweigh his men and his statements seemed to be borne out by the appearance of the squad. Notre Dame has only one 300 pounder in the line up with the relegation of McInery, the big 360-pound tackle to the second squad. Stephan, playing at left tackle, tips the scales at 351.

Notre Dame Averages 177. According to the weights given out by Harper this morning, the Notre Dame line weighs 1,417 pounds, an average of 177 pounds. The backfield brings the total weight up to 1,992 pounds or an average of 177 pounds to the man in weight. This would give the Huskers the advantage of a few pounds to the man. "We regard Nebraska as one of the few great teams in the country," Coach Harper said. "We are expecting a hard game and if we are beaten we will be beaten by a better team and will have no alibi. We are in splendid condition for the game."

Stiehm Not Bouncing. Coach Junbo Stiehm shares none of the optimism prevailing in the ranks of the undergraduates at Nebraska. The undergrads and the alumni are expecting Notre Dame to get a sound thrashing and made merry at the rally held yesterday. In fact Stiehm regards the over-confidence of the squad as the most dangerous enemy, which Nebraska will have to combat.

Coach Harper was granted the use of Nebraska field for a short time this afternoon, while the Notre Dame squad worked out the "kinks." The Catholics ran through a brisk signal practice behind clamped gates and then relinquished the field to the Huskers while Stiehm put his squad through its last drill before the big game.

Great Crowd Coming. Lincoln is all set to entertain the biggest crowd at a foot ball game in its history. The eyes of the western foot ball world are focused on the battle between the Huskers and the Notre Dame warriors, which, it is believed, will have an important bearing on the claims for the western championship.

Manager Guy E. Reed announced today that practically all of the seats had been sold and a crowd between 10,000 and 12,000 can be expected. Weather conditions promise to be ideal, with the temperature, if anything, just a little too high for the comfort of the players.

Calley May Have Chance. Coach Stiehm is leaning toward Calley, the little quarterback, to start the game for the Huskers. Calley's showing in the opening games was brilliant and experience will probably hand him the job over Cook, who also played a rattling good game against Washburn.

Walter Eckersall, in the capacity of referee, will have a chance to square at Nebraska's start in action against Notre Dame, for assistance in the selection of his all-weather eleven.

SHAW COMES BACK; HUSKERS REJOICE

Right Tackle Who Was Thought to Be Out for Year Will Play in Notre Dame Game.

FATHER WAS KILLED IN WRECK

LINCOLN, Neb., Oct. 21.—(Special.)—Edson Shaw, right tackle for the Cornhuskers, who was thought to be out of the game for the rest of the season because of the death of his father in the railroad accident at Randolph, Kan., last Saturday, sprang a surprise on his mates last evening by returning to Lincoln and will play in the Notre Dame game. Shaw's return is the most refreshing piece of news Cornhuskers have had all week. He was playing a slashing game at tackle and his loss threatened to disrupt the entire organization of the line. Now Stiehm will be able to shoot Stiehm back in his old position at guard and place Shaw at tackle. Shaw reported for practice this afternoon. The Cornhuskers had another spirited practice today—one of the hardest in recent years. First and second squads went at it tooth and toenail and the game was harder fought than the scrimmages the Huskers have engaged in in preparation for the Notre Dame game. Back and forth across the field the ball went, with neither side possessing the necessary punch to put it over. The second team men fought with all they had and made a most excellent showing against the regulars. Without exception the Nebraska squad is in good condition for a hard battle. All of the men have recovered from minor bruises received earlier in the season and are fit for the visitors. There are very few seats left for the Notre Dame game. Reed reported this morning that his expectation of 10,000 crowd were sure to be fulfilled. The Notre Dame eleven left this afternoon for Lincoln and will reach here tomorrow in time to engage in a short practice at the Country club grounds.
