Baidwin Leocomotive was the most impressive feature of the afternoon, advancing 10% points to 189%, within a fraction of its record. The rise in this stock gave currency to fresh rumors of an industrial consolidation, embracing that company with the newly organized Midvale Steel company and from torthern Ore properties. The two last named were very active and strong, while Midvale approximated its recent high price on the currb.
