HUSKERS MAY YET PLAY THE SOONERS

Jumbo Stiehm Cooking Up Hard Game in Proposal to Meet Oklahoma Team.

SOUTHERN MEN AGREEABLE

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Nov. 3.—(Special.)—“Jumbo” Stiehm’s Huskers and the proteges of Benny Owen of the University of Oklahoma are likely to meet in a post-season game at Kansas City. Arrangements for a battle between these two leaders of western and southern foot ball are progressing and are conditioned, of course, upon each team finishing the season with a clear record, as it seems certain they are to do.

“Jumbo” Stiehm turned down an offer from the Kansas City Veterinary college eleven for a post-season game, inasmuch as it is doubtful if the Missouri valley conference would grant permission for one of its members to meet such an organization. The conference would have to grant permission for the meeting of the schools. The Veterinary game would attract little attention in a financial way for the Huskers, either.

**Seeking Admittance.** With the Sooners, however, the conditions are entirely different. Oklahoma has been an applicant for admission to the Missouri valley conference and only distance has prevented its application from being favorably received. Coach Stiehm is confident that the conference would consent to a meeting between the two schools to determine the championship, providing each rounds out the season with a clear record. Oklahoma’s victory over the Jayhawkers last Saturday, with previous success over the Texas eleven, marks it as a school to be feared by any team in the country.

With a battle at Kansas City, Stiehm is confident that a great crowd of foot ball enthusiasts would attend and the game would be a marked financial success.

Benny Owen is not averse to a meeting between the two schools, as a telegram received today indicates: “Your idea meets with our heartiest approval. BEN G. OWEN.”

The “led” referred to in the telegram is a post-season game between the Huskers and Sooners at Kansas City. **Might Be Close Call.** There is an idea prevalent at Lincoln that Jumbo Stiehm would have to put his best foot forward in a game with the Sooners. Oklahoma’s light, fast team is without a rival in the country in the open game and Husker rooters still recall the battle three years ago, which ended in a 13-to-9 score for the Huskers. Stiehm is spending the entire week in preparing for the Kansas game, a week from next Saturday. He has had the variety busy running signals most of the week, but will put the men through a series of stiff scrimmage drills the last of the week.

**Long Rest for Regulars.** Most of the regulars will be given a long rest to prevent them from going stale and then work will be resumed the first of next week. The bulk of the battle against Wesleyan next Saturday will be borne by substitutes.

Manager Reed has sent word to Manager Hamilton at Kansas to reserve a section of at least 1,000 seats for the Nebraska rooters. Two excursions will be run from Lincoln, one including business men and the other students. Two hundred Lincoln business men will make the trip and 400 students.

State Attacks the Municipal Court

Suit filed in district court by the state of Nebraska and G. A. Magney against Richard E. Hamner, Arthur H. Murdock and Robert W. Patrick demands that they be required to show by what right they hold the position of judges of the municipal court, and that they be ousted from office and the law passed by the last legislature held unconstitutional. The attorneys for the state are H. H. Bowes and John G. Kuhn.

The law creating the municipal court was passed last winter and the three defendants appointed by the governor October 21.
