

MONARCHY OPPONENTS YIELD

Two Most Pronounced in Opposition Are Silent at the Move Under Way.

BOUGHT SAFETY BY PROCESS

(Correspondence of the Associated Press.) PEKING, Nov. 5.—President Yuan Shih-kai has never publicly given his official sanction to the efforts of the Chou An Hui, or Society for the Preservation of

Peace, to re-establish the monarchy, but failure of the government to uphold the board of censors in the impeachment of the members of the society, is generally regarded as proof that the society has the full approval of the president and his advisers. The board of censors, which is a sort of government-smelling committee, sustained charges brought against the Chou An Hui, and the government referred the impeachment to the minister of the interior. This cabinet member has now reported that all the promoters of the society are men of culture and scholars

of note and that their object is to engage in theoretical discussion of the principles of government, and not in any way to disturb the peace of the country. Special interest attaches now to movements of General Tuan Chi-ju, the former minister of war, and Vice President Li Yuang-hung, the two most prominent opponents of the restoration of the monarchy. It has been frequently rumored that General Tuan Shi-ju was assassinated. This, however, is not true. Chi-ju is retained. Last week General Tuan Chi-ju submitted a memorial to the president, urging that with the coming of autumn his "health" had not improved, and for this reason he wished to be unburdened of the special duties devolving upon him in the headquarters of the army and navy. The distinguished general craved permission to leave Peking that he might make his way back to his native home in Anhui, and restore the tombs of his ancestors. However, the president graciously refused his request, as he desires to consult his former secretary of war from time to time on matters of high moment. Vice President Li Yuang-hung is now enjoying greater liberty than formerly.

He has moved from the palace in the Forbidden City, where he was practically a prisoner, and is now living with his family in a mansion purchased for him in the Chinese city near the legation quarter. The mansion was formerly used as a reception place for the military club, and is situated in a beautiful garden. Price of Freedom. This extension of greater freedom to the vice president is generally believed to have come about as a result of his refusal to participate in the monarchical movement. For a time it seemed that he would be an open opponent of the re-

stitution of the monarchy. His lack of sympathy with the change is understood throughout the republic, and his greater freedom is believed to be the price the government paid for his silent acquiescence. Religion and religious organizations are also playing an important part in the monarchical movement. Efforts have been made by the Society for the Preservation of Peace to get the support of prominent religionists. But the announcement that Mohammedans who joined the society were authorized to do so by the Mutual Advancement Society of Moham-

medans caused a flareback. Chang Tien-tao and twenty-two other leaders in the Mohammedan society immediately published an announcement denying the authority of any member to represent that body in any political movement and hotly resenting the attempt of individuals to speak for the 15,000,000 Mohammedans living in China. Most of the Mohammedans in China live in Chinese Turkistan, and neighboring provinces, far west of the well-known cities of the republic.
