

NOGALES. Aris. Nov. 15.-Carlos tandall, Villa governor of Sonora, announced today that General Villa and the Yaqui Chief Urbalejo had attacked Hermosille today with their combined forces. The last Villa troops evacuated Naco yesterday. Hermosillo, according to Carranga officials, is occupied by General Manuel Diegues, with 8,000 men. Villa is said to have about 11,000 men, including Urbalejo's force of 1,500 Yaquis. Carlos Linns, who claims to be
