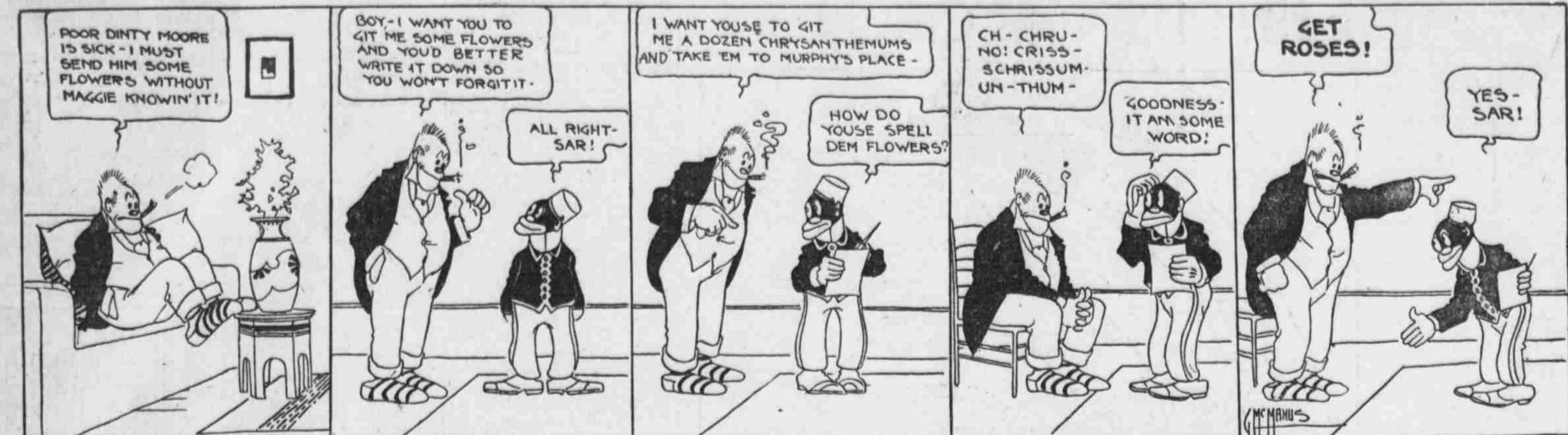

NEW YORK STOCK MARKET

Railway Shares Are Almost the Only Redeeming Feature of Session.

SHOW GENERAL STRENGTH

NEW YORK, Nov. 18.—Railway shares were almost the only redeeming feature of today's irregular and professional market, these issues displaying general strength and a broader inquiry for an early period of hesitancy. Erie was the most active stock in the list and advanced 1/2 to 4 1/2 in highest price in almost a decade. Union Pacific's steady rise of almost three points, to 14 1/2, the top quotation of the year, stimulated a demand for such stocks as St. Paul, Great Northern, Reading, Lehigh Valley and New Haven, which were higher by one to two points.

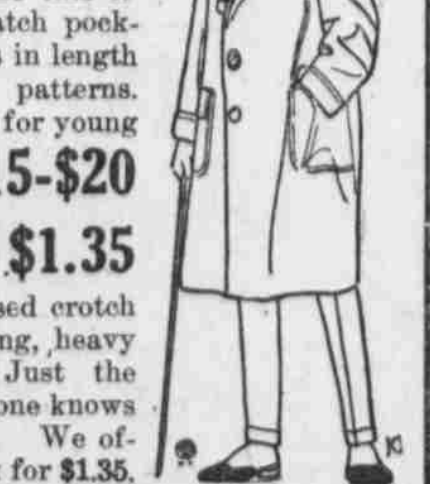
