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Harvard Tramples On Sons of Eli in Cambridge Game

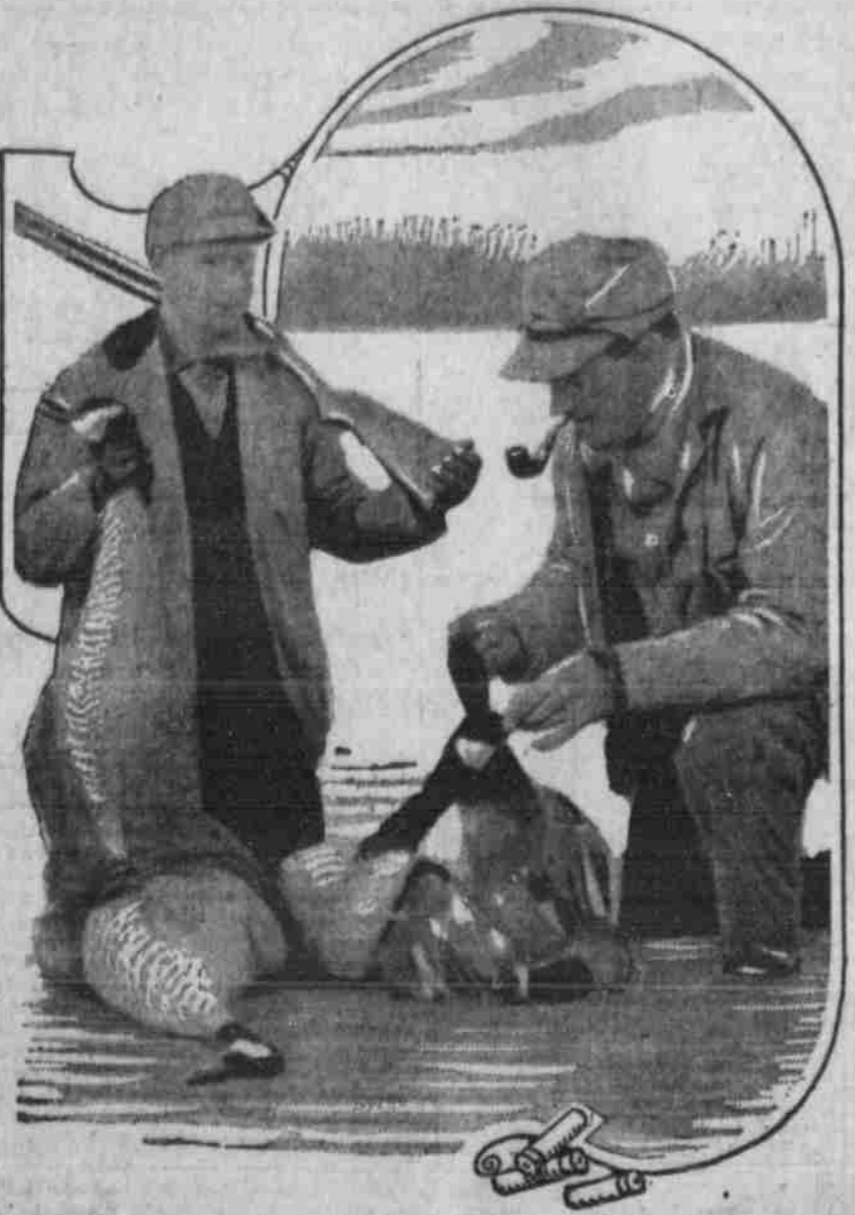
Yale passed over the goal line. A Yale man was off-side, however, and the score was not allowed.
