ST. LOUIS GIVEN BOWLERS' MEET

Found City Captures 1916 Tourney and Promises to Enter Hundred Teams on Alleys Then.

St. Louis was chosen as the place for holding the 1916 tournament of the Midwest Bowling association, and the chief officers were re-elected, at the annual meeting of the association, held Sunday at the Farnam alleys, where the big bowling tourney is being rolled.

The choice of St. Louis for the next tournament was done after little deliberation, for the down-river bowlers were so well represented and put up such a strong bid for the honor of entertaining the next tournament, that Lincoln, the only other bidder, was hardly in the race at all.

Will Enter Hundred Teams. The St. Louis bowlers were on hand fifty strong, and by way of clinching their claim to the next tournament, they guaranteed to enter 100 St. Louis teams next year.

Will Use Eight Alleys. As Lincoln was the only other city after the next convention, it was generally agreed that that city would be able to have the tournament come there the year after, in 1917.

Matches Hotly Contested. Although last night's five-man team matches at the Farnam alleys were interesting and hotly contested, none of the scores approached the high lead of 2,720 chalked up the night before by the Jack Daniels quintet of St. Louis, which still holds the lead.

The Palace Cafe five of LeMars came the closest to the leaders, making a total of 2,704. The Alpen Brau team of St. Louis, last year's champs, scored only 2,695, so will have to go some if they retain their title this year.

Special reports from the front say that the number of Serbian prisoners taken last week was 26,000 and that the Serbians lost more than 500 cannon.

Meanwhile Austrian and German troops are marching through the Sanjak. Apparently heavy cannon and ammunition already have arrived at the Gallipoli peninsula for reinforcement of the Turkish artillery.

British secretary for the colonies, who was preparing public opinion for evacuation of the Gallipoli peninsula in the near future. Field Marshal Kitchener is to decide to what part of the world the Dardanelles army shall be transferred. It probably will be sent to Saloniki.

Italy Rejects Appeal. No one expects Italy to give assistance to the entente troops in Macedonia. Field Marshal Kitchener, himself, made an effort in Rome to obtain a promise of troops, at least for Egypt, in case England should be obliged to send reinforcements to India and southern Persia for her army in Egypt.

The Italian losses on the Isonzo front have been appalling. If attempts to conquer Gorizia once more fail, Italian public opinion will not consent under any circumstances to the use of Italian troops outside of Italy in order to help England out of her embarrassments after her failures at the Dardanelles and in Serbia.

Great Number of Helpless Accompany Serb Forces Retreating Through Hills.

ITALIAN LOSSES APPALLING

BERLIN, Nov. 22.—(By wireless to Sayville.)—Discussing the situation in the Balkans, the Overseas News agency says:

The defeated Serbian army drags slowly along over the snow-covered mountain trails, accompanied by a large number of women, children and aged persons. The Serbians already have crossed the Montenegrin frontier, but inasmuch as Montenegro already is suffering from lack of food, it is extremely difficult to care for the newcomers.

Frequently Montenegrin patrols approach the Austrian vanguard sentries and beg for bread.

The shooting was heard by the police, but by the time surgeons arrived both were dead.

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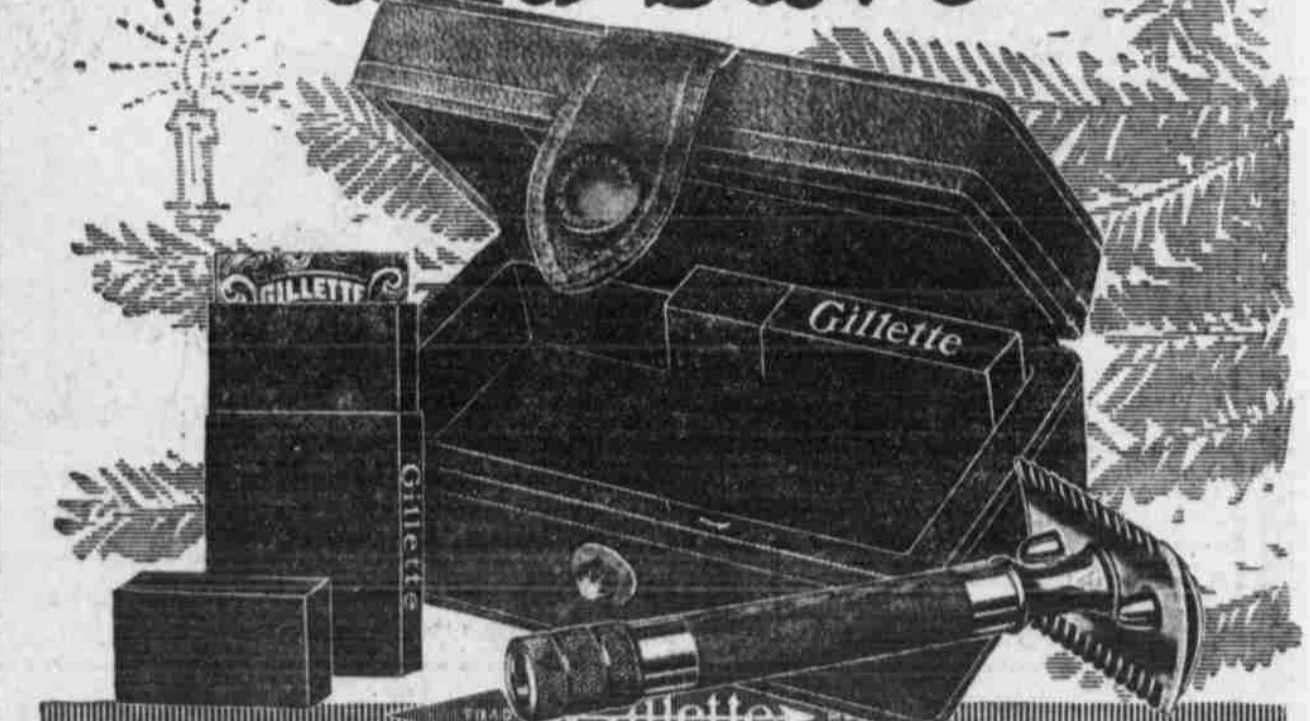
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MEXICAN GENERAL KILLS ANOTHER IN DANCE HALL
