BERLIN, Nov. 22 .- (By wireless to Sayville.) - Discussing the situation in the Balkans, the Overseas News agency says:

"The defeated Serbian army drags slowly along over the snow-covered mountain trails, accompanied by a large number of women, children and aged persons. The Serbians already have crossed the Montenegrin frontier, but inasmuch as Montenegro already is suffering from lack of food, it is extremely difficult to care for the newcomers. Frequently Montenegrin patrols approach the Austrian vanguard sentries and beg for bread.
