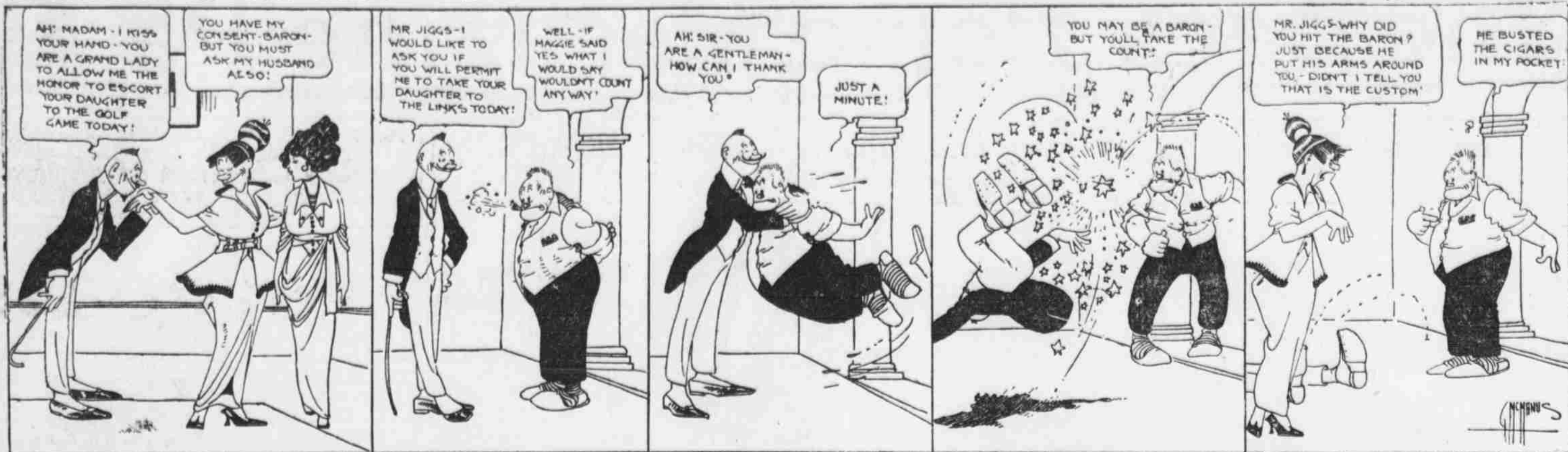

ARMY AND NAVY BOUT TODAY

Soldier and Sailor Foot Ball Teams Will Break Tie at New York This Afternoon.

SQUADS ARE EVENLY MATCHED

NEW YORK, Nov. 23.—The Army and Navy foot ball teams meet in this city tomorrow in the twentieth contest between eleven representing the navy and military academies since the series began in 1890. The service game will be in the eastern gridiron season and carries additional interest this year owing to the fact a decisive result will break the tie existing between the soldier and sailor elevens. As the score stands tonight, each academy has won nine games, with one ending in a tie score.

Dignitaries Will Attend

The game tomorrow will be no exception for the social, service and official circles of the national will be represented at the Polo grounds from the chief executive of the United States down through the diplomatic, naval and military corps to the midshipman and lieutenant just graduated from Annapolis or West Point.

Teams Evenly Matched

The records of the entire series to date show that during a period of more than twenty-five years, the two academies have been evenly matched. Each institution has won and lost nine games, while the contest 1906, played at Princeton, resulted in a 6 to 6 tie. All the other matches have been played at Philadelphia or New York. In total points scored the army leads with 323 to the navy's 226.

Kaiser Tells Pope Germany Fighting in Self-Defense

ROME, Nov. 23.—(Via Paris.)—It was asserted in well informed quarters here today that Cardinal Von Hartmann, archbishop of Cologne, who arrived in Rome yesterday, was the bearer of a message from Emperor William to Pope Benedict in which the emperor is reported to have disclaimed responsibility for the war. Germany was described as having been forced into it in self-defense.

French Report They Gain in Offensive

PARIS, Nov. 23.—A victory for the French forces in Serbia, in an offensive movement undertaken on Tuesday last, is reported in a dispatch from Saloniki filed yesterday to the Havas agency. The French are said to have captured the town of Brounik, west of Kriivolak.

Guardian of Grant's Tomb Dead
