

## AWARDS ARE MADE AT POULTRY SHOW

Prize Winners Are Chosen but Announcement of the Fortunate Ones is Delayed.

### CHICKS KEEPING LATE HOURS

Awards have all been made at the chicken show in the Auditorium, but announcement of the winners will not be published until later. Visitors can see the award ribbons attached to all the cages. It has been a big job to get this done and Secretary Baehr is about the busiest man in town.

Everything points to a most successful show. The crowd is very satisfactory to the promoters. A number of exhibitors are here from distant points. Superintendents of three other poultry shows are here setting pointers which they may use in their exhibitions.

Ten settings of eggs are among the special prizes which will be awarded to the public tonight. Each admission ticket has a number and these numbers entitle each person to a chance on the special prizes. A pair of birds, either White Leghorns or Rhode Island Reds, is also on the special prize list.

### Chicks Stay Up Late.

Visitors in the morning remarked on the number of birds who were asleep with their bills tucked snugly under their right wings. But, explains President Munson, this is only natural considering how long they have to stay awake evenings. In their native yards Mr. and Mrs. Chicken retire with the sun. At the show, beneath the electric lights, they don't get a chance to retire until 11 or 12 o'clock. It's a gas life.

The Hamburgs and the White Leghorns occupy adjoining quarters and seem on friendly terms in spite of the war between the countries of their respective origin.

The smallest chickens in the show are a pair of Black Breasted Games. They're hardly bigger than pigeons and they took two firsts.

### Leghorn Cockerel Dies.

Alas, poor George! George was a White Leghorn cockerel, the property of Guy Schreff of Lincoln. Schreff groomed him for the show and sent him up. To arrived here Wednesday evening, already with a slight cold, says Show Superintendent Jacobs. He had apparently been shipped too soon after the bath which is given to all white birds just before going to the show.

George was so sick he could hardly emit a crow. He tried his best, but his "whistle" was rusty. The crowd developed rapidly into a mob in spite of all that Jacobs' medical skill and experience could do, and George expired early on Thanksgiving day, just when so many of his brothers were meeting a bloody death in the trenches before dinner.

"He would probably have taken a first," said Jacobs, sadly.

## President Spends Thanksgiving Day Typing His Message

WASHINGTON, Nov. 26.—Thanksgiving day was spent by President Wilson at his typewriter working on his annual message to congress, and he typed away until late tonight, so as to have the document in the hands of the public printer tomorrow.

Abandoning plans he had made for spending the day with Mrs. Norman Galt, his fiancée, the president locked the door of his private study, and emerged only for a short automobile ride in the afternoon, and to eat Thanksgiving dinner with his family.

The president expected to complete the address early in the day, and a force of clerks was on hand at the White house to prepare it. It is probable that the contest over the national defense before the next session of congress will be one of the most important of his administration, and Mr. Wilson is devoting more than usual care and time to preparation of the address. While he consulted the members of his cabinet about general features, the actual writing of it has been done in seclusion, and without the advice of anyone.

## American-Built Ships Figure in the War

(Correspondence of the Associated Press.) PARIS, Oct. 20.—American-built ships and American big guns will figure in the first line of any naval operations growing out of the Balkan conflict, as the former American battleships Idaho and Mississippi, now the Greek battleships Kilkis and Lemnos, are the best warships possessed by any of the Balkan states, while the fourteen-inch guns built by the Bethlehem works for Greece are now doing service at the Dardanelles.

The Balkans have a long stretch of coast on the Mediterranean and Black seas, making naval operations likely on both of these fronts. All the states have navies, except Serbia. The Greeks had ordered a monster super-dreadnought, of 23,000 tons, but this is cancelled. They also had the Salamis, 19,500 tons, building in Vulcan yards of Germany, which the Germans quickly appropriated. This leaves them with the former Idaho and Mississippi in the first line, the Avencor of 10,000 tons, three 5,000-ton cruisers, twelve gunboats, and a fair-sized flotilla of destroyers and torpedo boats, including two submarines. One of the best Greek submarines was being built in France, and was taken over by France only two weeks ago because Greece was behind on payments.

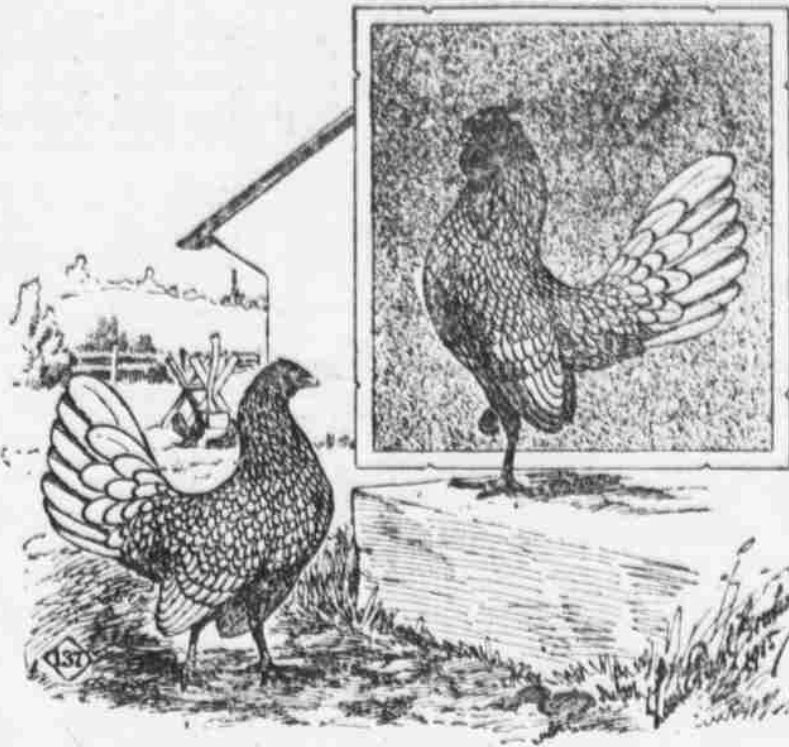
Bulgaria has a Mediterranean and Black Sea fleet. But its navy is insignificant, consisting of the gunboat Medea of 900 tons, six torpedo gunboats, and four small craft, including King Ferdinand's royal yacht, the Kroum, which is strongly armed. Should Russia bombard Varna, Bulgaria's Black sea port, as has been threatened, Bulgaria could make little naval resistance beyond that from shore batteries.

## ALLIES PREPARING FOR LONG STAY AT SALONIKI

LONDON, Nov. 25.—The Reuters correspondent at Zurich says, that according to reports received there from Vienna, the allies are preparing to remain at Saloniki for an indefinite period, as they are landing machinery for an electric power station, besides awarding contracts for an extensive and substantial barracks.

## War Sends Down The Rental Values On London Property

(Correspondence of The Associated Press.) LONDON, Nov. 25.—Rentals of business properties in London have decreased during the last year. Even in cases where property is being rented under long-term leases, the landlords have frequently recognized the position in which the war may have placed their tenants by giving appreciable rebates on the contract figures. In the Stock exchange district 40 per cent has been knocked off the pre-war rental in many cases rather than lose a desirable tenant.

Office and loft-building property is naturally very difficult to rent at the present time. Many professional and business men whose leases have expired during the last twelve months have taken advantage of this condition to secure new quarters at far lower rentals or else retain their old quarters on more or less nominal terms.

Real estate men state that the big reductions in rental values have proved a serious matter to many landlords and property-holders, companies whose income is dependent upon the renting of high priced offices. The higher range of interest values at the present time, which moreover is practically certain to last for many years after the war, also tends to lower the return on rented property of all kinds, as there is no likelihood of renewal of mortgages at the old rate of 4 or 4 1/2 per cent.

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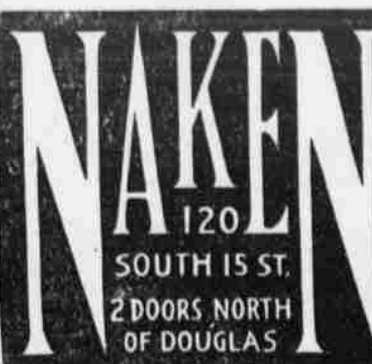

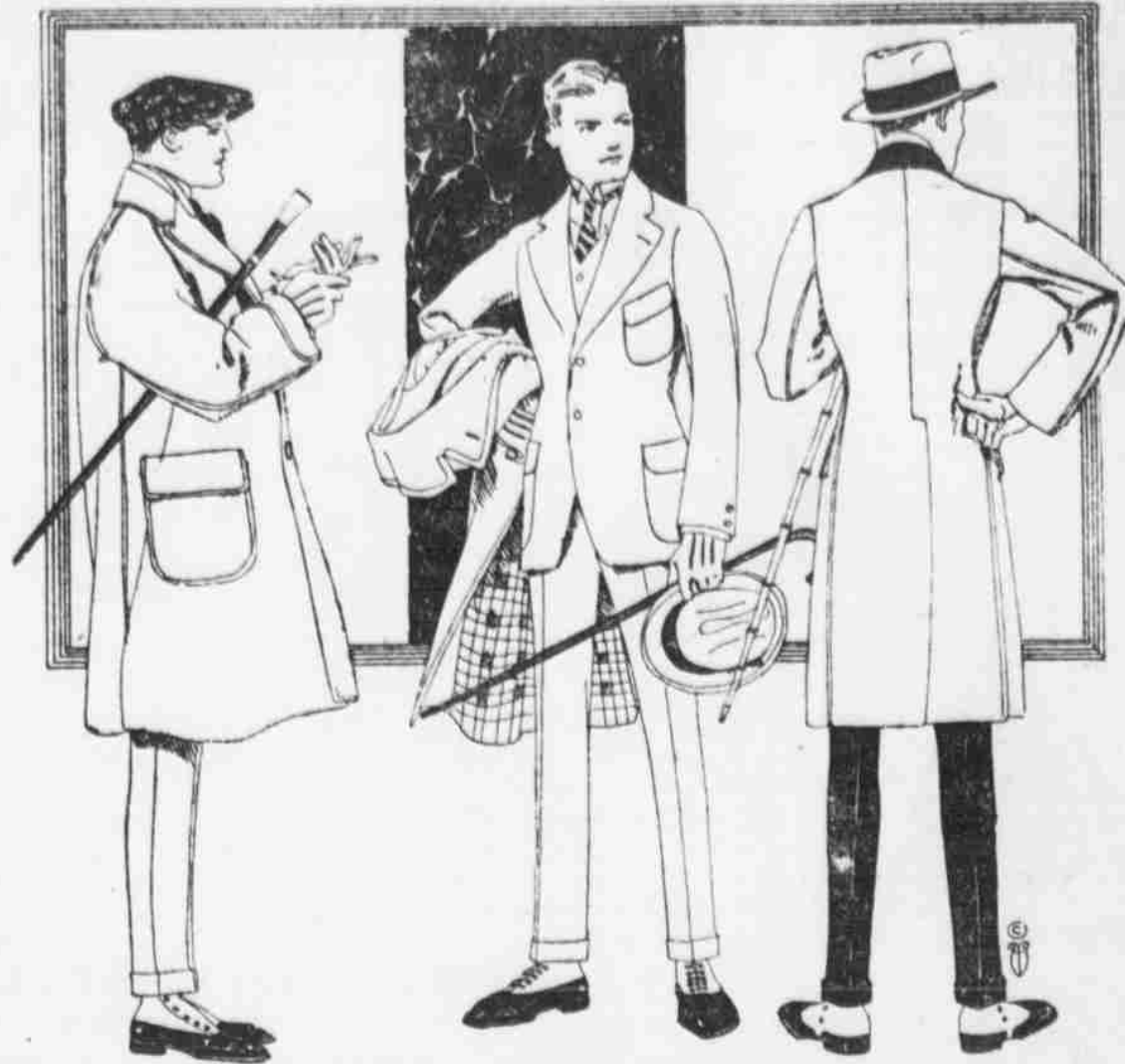

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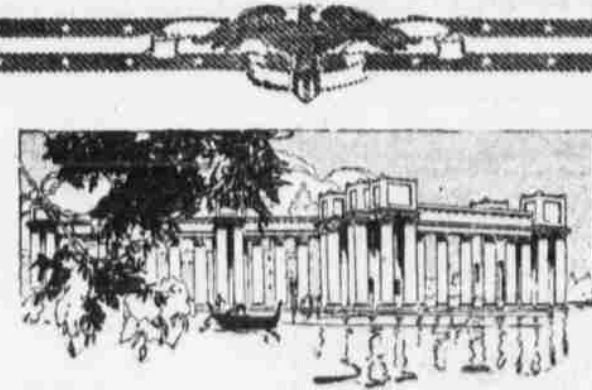
