Johnson to Find Buyer.

Ban B. Johnson, president of the Amercan league, who conferred today and tonight with Sommers, John E. Bruce, secretary of the National Base Ball commission, and John Sherwin, chairman of bankers' committee, said tonight that if the committee wishes to sell the Claveland American team he will find a purchaser.

"The bankers' committee will not tolerate the present situation any longer," said a prominent member of the commit-tee tonight; "It has come to the point where we will have to sell the club. Half a dozen men have been mentioned as possible purchasers of the Cleveland American club, among them being James McGill, owner of the Denver Western League club and the Indianapolis club at Least a Month of the American association; E. G. Barrows, president of the International league, and J. W. Corrigan, Price Mc-Kinney and Charles A. Otis of Cleveland. Barrows was here today, but denied his presence had anything to do with the Cleveland base ball situation.

Stands By Cluba.

"I will see that a buyer in forthcoming if the committee wishes to sell the Cleveland club," said Johnson tonight. "If a sale is decided upon I will try to interest local capital first. If it is financial aid that is needed, the American league will provide it, as the league has always stood by its clubs." Sommers and the bankers declined to make any statement.
