Matters of a highly technical nature were taken up during the morning session, particularly the standardization of certain mental tests and their correlation with school abilities, by Prof. Irving King, associate professor of education University of Iowa. By means of a chart and the plotting of curves he illustrated the relative speed with which pupils in the several grades were able to perform certain mental tests set before them.

Clarence W. Schroeder, professor of social science, Tabor college, discussed the paper and called attention to the system already employed in New York City, Topeks, Kan., and other places of employing several special teachers to give their time to helping the backward pupils in the schools. He said that New York is them under the direct charge of teachers specially employed to help them.
