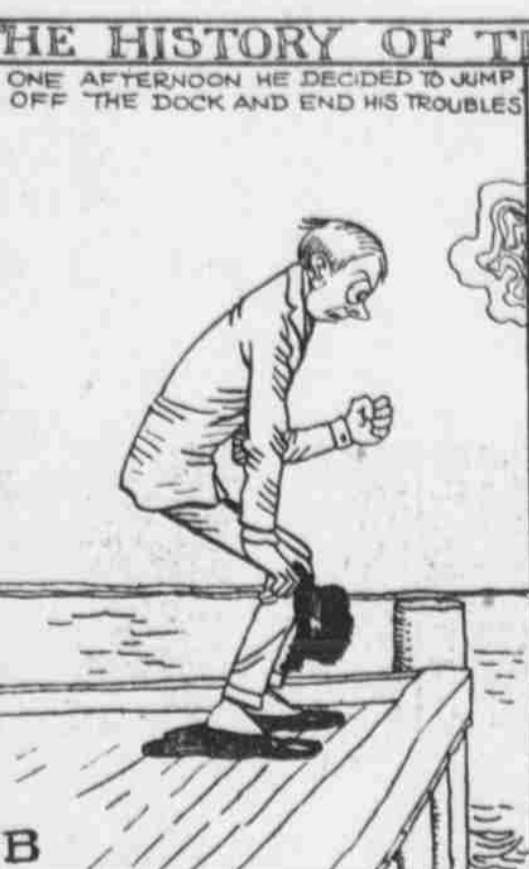

THE HISTORY OF THE CASE.

GUNNERS START OUT WITH A WIN

Give Walter G. Clarks Trimming in Game Full of Features.

THIRTY-THREE TO THIRTY-ONE

After tying the score three times and jumping in the lead twice, the Townsend Gun club five defeated the Walter G.

Clarks at the Young Men's Christian association last evening in the second extra five minutes of play, 33 to 31. Not until the last tool of the referee's horn was the contest decided, and even then it might have gone five additional minutes, as Nolan of the Clarks flipped a basket one second after the contest was called, but which was not allowed. The game was the most exciting and interesting from the spectators' point of view, ever staged on the gym floor and served as a fitting opening of the Tri-City loop. Carl Hansen, substitute guard for the gunners, who replaced Carl Weigel, made the lucky flip for the gunners in the second extra five-minute period.

From the start the Clarks jumped in the lead and throughout the first period were never headed. The half-time count ended 17 to 12. On the restart the Clarks began to increase their lead, but were jerked up short when the Gunners by gradual and persistent team work began overhauling their contemporaries. A basket by Carl Weigel, followed by Lutes and Harris, put the Gunners on a par, the half ending with a 29 to 29 tie. Both fives had plenty of chances to cop the game in the extra minutes of play. Each missed a number of easy goals, the ball at times rolling about the hoop in a tantalizing manner. Both fives were also off in foul goal shooting. Par-

rish landing five out of twelve attempts and Harris seven out of fourteen. While all the players put up a brand of playing seldom equalled on a local court, the work of Bechtold at center for the Gunners was more than above the average. Though outweighed and smaller than his opposing man, Bechtold out-jumped his lanky opponent on a number of occasions.
