This is the letter which he mailed out to all Nebraska high schools this week as a preliminary notice of the tourna-

"The annual basket ball tournament of Nebraska high schools will be held under the auspices of the University of Nebraska March S to 11. This is an invitation to your high school to be a

This tournament has been the largest in America in the last few years. It is rare treat for the boys to compete in tournament of such magnitude. They are able to see the best sort of basket ball. They are thus given an opportunity to meet the other boys of the state. They are also privileged to see the university or other institutions of higher learning in this city.

This year the teams will be divided inte three classes, based on the season's record, the size of the town of the high school and tournament experience. This plan enables the boys to go through the entire tournament without over-exertion. A physician will be on the floor all the time and a doctor's examination must be had before teams will be permitted to compete. This is necessary in order that no athlete may be injured by poor condition.

DR. STEWART WILL SUCCEED STIEHM

Coach of Oregon Aggies Will Be Director of Athletics at Nebraska.

STIEHM THROWS UP HIS JOB

LINCOLN, Neb., Jan. 8 .- (Special Telegram.)-Nebraska's new athletic director will be Dr. E. J. Stewart, famous director and foot ball coach of the Oregon Aggies, according to announcement made here tonight by the Nebraska athletic board. Stewart succeeds "Jumbo" Stiehm at the helm of Husker affairs with a remarkable record of achievement in all branches of university sport. The offer of the Nebraska athletic board was forwarded to Stewart early in the week, and his acceptance received today completes the

At the same time the Nebraska board announced Captain R. B. Rutherford, the cashing leader of the 1915 Huskers, would assist Dr. Stewart in his work in a newlycreated department, which will give Nebraska the services of an assistant allyear coach at a salary or \$2,500 a year.

Rutherford's selection marks the creation of a new department in university athletics, with special attention to the development of high tschool material,

To Get \$3,000 a Year.

The contract with Dr. Stewart calls for a salary of \$5,000 the first year, with an increase to \$3,500 the second year if he is retained.

Guy R. Reed is to remain as assistant director of athletics and manager of an increase in salary of from \$1,290 to \$2,600. Nebraska's new coach is 40 years of age, stands five fee eleven inches and weighs 1% pounds. He has all the carmarks of a trained athlete and isexceedingly pleasant to meet.

Dr. Stewart first took three years of collegiate work at Mount Union college in Alliance, O., and then completed a four-year medical course at Western Reserve university at Cleveland, where ha secured the degree of B, S, and M. D. His medical studies were taken with a special view toward fitting himself for the life work of athletic director. He further specialized in athletics at

the summer course of Chautauqua (N. Y.) School of Physical Education.

Seven Years' Experience.

Dr. Stewart bring to Nebraska seven years of coaching experience. His first work as athletic director was at Mount Union college, where he developed a conference champion foot ball team during the two years he served there. He was then called to Allegheny college at Mendville, Pa., where he whipped a tail-end eleven into a conference champion against such rivals as the famous Washington and Jefferson, Pittsburgh and Carnegie Technical elevens.

Dr. Stewart next took charge of basket ball at Purdue university and raised the boilermakers from the cellar position in the big nine conference to runners-up for the championship.
