

### BOWLERS PLAN FOR CITY TOURNAMENT

Entries Already Coming in for Annual Event on Farnam Alleys.

#### SEVERAL OTHER TOURNEYS

The close of the holiday season and the recent cold snap have sent the bowlers to the runways and the increased clutter of the pins is noticeable. Other causes for the renewed activity of the bowlers are the announcements of special events coming off in the near future.

The annual city tournament, in which the winners are declared city champions, has been set for January 23. This big local event, which is looked forward to by all the bowlers, will be rolled under the same conditions this year as last. Allys Nos. 5, 6, 7, 8, 9 and 10 at the Farnam, the same ones used in the recent Midwest tournament, will be used and the same cross-alley system will be used in every event. The usual teams, doubles and singles events will be rolled on a scratch basis. Entrance fees have been made \$2 per man in the team event and \$1 per man in the doubles and singles. As this tournament is rolled under the sanction of the American Bowling congress, an additional fee of \$1 is charged as annual dues to the congress. Teams must participate in this tournament to become members of the American Bowling congress and be eligible to bowl in the big tournament held by this organization in Toledo during March. Entries close at midnight January 23 and should be sent to Secretary C. J. Cain at 1907 Farnam street. Arrangements will probably be made for the women to take part in a separate team event.

**Gate City Event.**  
Another tournament to be held this month is the annual Gate City tournament. This affair will be rolled on the Morrison alleys and is open to leagues rolling on the Morrison alleys, excepting the Omaha league. Teams will be entered from the Omaha Gas, Omaha Electric, and Power, Lithographers and Gate City leagues. The tournament will be rolled on a handicap basis. On account of the handicap system, the entire membership of all the above leagues are expected to enter. Secretary Jake Stino of the Gate City league is receiving the entries. The events will be rolled on January 27, 28 and 29 and the entries close January 25. An entrance fee of \$1 per man in the team event and 50 cents per man in the doubles and singles will be charged.

The Huntington handicap tournament will not be staged this month as planned, but will be held about the middle of February. Miss Birdie Kern, world's champion woman bowler, will appear in action on the runways during the progress of this tournament.

#### Omaha Teams at Fremont.

Another tournament of interest to the local pin topplers is the sweepstakes tournament held in Fremont on January 26. The matches are open to all and entries will be received from outside points. Omaha will enter about five teams, Lincoln, three; Wahoo, Schuyler, Grand Island and Columbus, one each, and tournament entry will be about three teams. The entrance fee will be \$25 per team, which will make a large pot to be split three ways. Omaha teams are especially interested in this event, due to the magnitude of the cash prizes. They will be pitted, however, against some strong teams and will have to make a strong showing in order to win.

The annual Metropolitan handicap tournament will be held early in February. It will be open to the world. Full arrangements have not been made by Manager McCabe, but his promises some new and novel features in tournament play.

Entry blanks for the International tournament at Minneapolis have been received. No regular organized Omaha teams plan to enter but a few individual bowlers are laying plans for at least one all-star team to represent the Gate City. The Twin City bowlers and International officials were very loyal in their support of the recent Midwest tournament held here, and the local bowling fraternity hopes to partially reciprocate for the splendid entry and showing made by the tenpin artists from the north.

Five strong Omaha quintets plan to enter the big tournament held by the American Bowling congress at Toledo during March. Four of them, the Luxus, Metz, Storz and Jettlers' Old Age, are the pick of the Omaha league, and the other, the Jettlers' Old Age team, will have six of the best from the Brunswick alleys on the South Side. None of these have sent in their entries yet, but will do so as soon as they pick their dates.

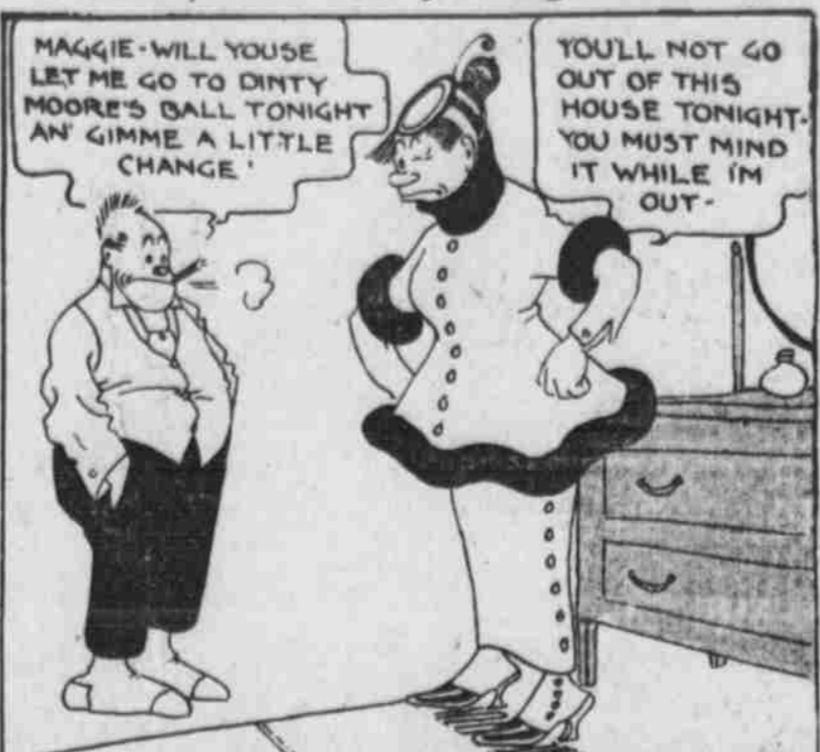

### Skaters and Ice Cutters Make Use of the Lakes Around Omaha

There was no need to telephone to the city hall yesterday to find out if there was ice on the various lakes in and near the city for skaters. There was ice most everywhere. The very wind that shrieked from the north seemed to be made of gaseous ice, as it cut and numbed noses and ears.

But zero weather and biting wind didn't keep the skaters from the ice. By early in the afternoon the little lakes at Hanscom, Riverview, Pontelle, Miller and Curtis Turner parks were filled with merry crowds, though most of the skaters were of the juvenile order.

Fires were built at some of the lakes and at others, where there are amusements, roaring fires blazed in the stoves and offered facilities for thawing out.

Carter lake is a great smooth sheet of ice. There's real "man's size" skating there and on its surface, with its wooded shores and wide open space, one can almost imagine himself far from

civilization. But this was notably deserted yesterday. In the afternoon there were perhaps 100 on the lake, but on the large space they didn't "show up" much for a crowd.

Ice harvesting proceeded at full blast, "cut ice while the weather's cold," is the rule and the day of rest was not observed. At Carter lake and Seymour lake large forces of men and teams were at work and the automatic machinery for putting the blocks into the houses made the harvest great. The ice has now attained a thickness of from sixteen to twenty inches and the houses are filling rapidly. More men can be put to work and Captain Kline of the Salvation Army stated that he could give ice-cutting jobs to 25 men right now if he could get them.

The cold was so great that a number of the churches of the city omitted their evening services.
