SIXTY THOUSAND FOR WILLARD BOUTS

Madison Square Garden Manager Guarantees that Much for Two Battles.

ANNOUNCEMENT BY JOHNSTON

CHICAGO, Jan. 19.—Guarantees of \$50,000 to Jess Willard for two fights in Madison Square Garden, New York, and of \$20,000 to Frank Moran for two contests, were announced here today by Jimmy Johnston, manager of the Garden.

Johnston's announcement follows: "I will guarantee Jess Willard \$50,000 for two fights, Moran to be his first opponent. Should Willard win decisively I am to have the privilege of selecting his second opponent. I also will guarantee Frank Moran \$20,000 for two fights, the first to be with Willard, Moran to receive \$15,000 for his end. If he outpoints Willard I will place the money in a bank immediately after the men sign articles."

They Are Out of It. KANSAS CITY, Mo., Jan. 19.—Rickard and McCracken are out of it; they had their opportunity to get the match and refused to meet our figures.

"I've signed with Curley, and that ends the matter. Moran's signing does not make a bit of difference to us. He is lucky to get a fight with Willard, and Willard does not care whether he fights him or not."

Johnston had just returned from Excelsior Springs, Mo., where he and Willard had been resting. The manager said he signed with Curley because Curley offered 45 per cent of the gross receipts and 51 per cent of the moving picture proceeds.

Curley guaranteed \$2,500 as Willard's share.

"Rickard and McCracken," said Johnston, "refused to make any percentage arrangement. The guarantee is not the big thing in the fight. In expert Willard's share under the percentage arrangement to exceed \$52,000."

"Moran can sign the articles with Willard, or he need not. Moran is the man to worry—not the champion."

Purse is Increased. NEW YORK, Jan. 19.—Tex Rickard and Samuel McCracken, who made the original offer of \$45,000 for a ten-round bout here between Jess Willard and Frank Moran, increased that offer today to \$60,000.

They have come to an agreement with Moran by which the Pittsburgh man's end of the purse will be \$17,000 instead of \$15,000, and have wired to Willard and his manager that they will give the world's champion \$22,000, the original offer having been \$20,000.

Moran said today that he had accepted the terms offered by Rickard and McCracken with the understanding that the bout should be indoors next March, and until the expiration of that month he would not consider any propositions to meet Willard.

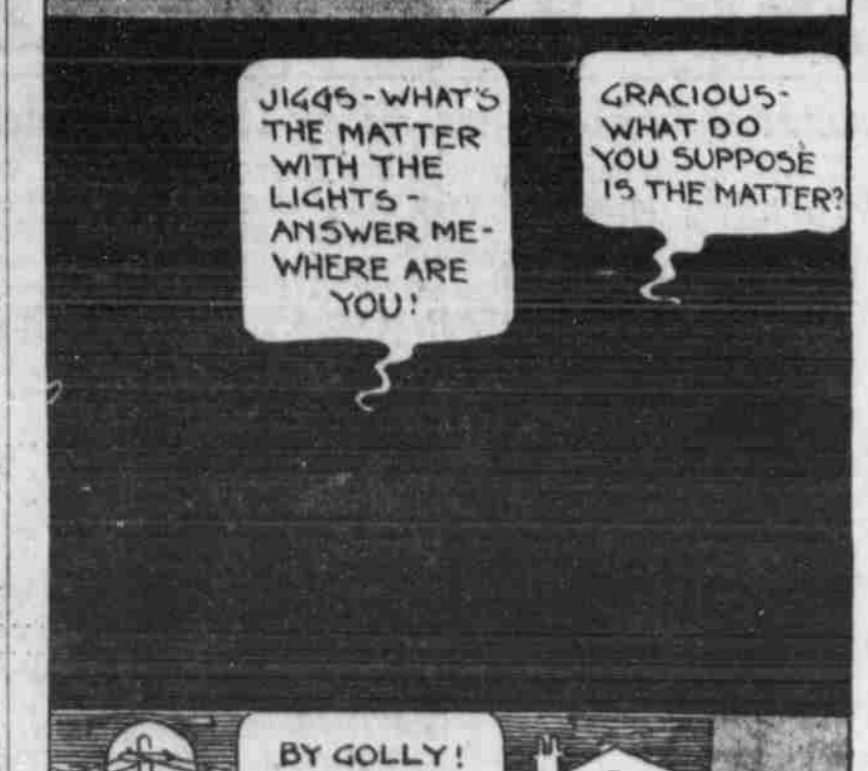

Weeghman Will Take Over Chicago National League Club at Noon.

CHECK READY TO PRESENT

CHICAGO, Jan. 19.—The formal passing of the Chicago National League baseball club from the ownership of Charles P. Taft to Charles H. Weeghman will take place tomorrow at noon. This statement was made tonight by President Weeghman of the Chicago club.

Mr. Weeghman said the check was ready for presentation to Charles Schmalstig, the representative of Mr. Taft, who arrived in Chicago today. Mr. Schmalstig and Mr. Weeghman held a conference tonight, arranging some minor details in regard to the transfer of the stock.

A meeting of the stockholders of the combined Chicago Federals and Chicago Nationals was held tonight, at which Harry Ackerman, who holds some stock in the old Cubs, was introduced. He said he did not want to sell his stock.

George Westeral, third baseman, and William R. Jackson, first baseman of the Chicago Federals, today were released by President Weeghman of the Chicago Nationals, to the St. Joseph (Mo.) team of the Western league.

Farrell Gives Out A List of Federals Who Are Released

AUBURN, N. Y., Jan. 19.—Secretary John H. Farrell of the National Association of Professional Base Ball Leagues, today gave out the list of players who have been released by the Federal league as a result of the recent peace pact, and who are now free agents, so far as the Federal league is concerned.

Farrell said: "National association players automatically revert to the association club entitled to them when they left Organized Base Ball. If that club does not wish said player, he may negotiate with another club. All players must be tendered contracts on or before March 1."
