NEW YORK, Jan. 25.—The trend of to-day's session must have been a source of disappointment to those who hoped that the constructive factors employed by the resumption of the United states steel common dividend and inst corporation's remarkable statement of earnings would lift the market out of its recent pessimistic mood. Further foreign liquidation was accepted as the chief obstacles, although domestic developments, such as the threatened contest between the railroads and their employes, assumed considerable importance.
