

MILITARY SERVICE WILL BE REQUIRED

Dr. Edward Breck Tells Commercial Club Ignorance Keeps Preparedness Back.

SAYS PENSIONS ARE GRAFT

The time is coming shortly when military service will be required in all the schools and out of them in America," said Dr. Edward Breck, representative of the National Navy League, in speaking on preparedness before the Commercial club at noon.

"It is ignorance that is keeping people back from this program of preparedness. All are in favor of it when they know the facts. President Wilson was against it, and so was I. All honor to a man who will change his mind on so great a subject."

The speaker maintained that we cannot stand by the Monroe doctrine, and we cannot defend the Panama canal and keep it neutral and open to all ships unless we have a large navy.

"The Monroe doctrine," said the speaker, "is one of the cockiest policies ever announced by a nation. Without a big navy it is a mere bluff, as some of the German officers have told me many a time face to face. I remember some years ago one of them said to me: 'The Monroe doctrine is a gigantic bluff, and the first time we get a chance to call it we will call it hard.'"

Must Keep Monroe Doctrine.

"But we must stick to the Monroe Doctrine," said the speaker. "Why, bless you, you could not abandon the Monroe Doctrine now if you wanted to. If you tried to let go of it, it would not let go of you."

Dr. Breck touched on the criticism that is heaped upon the Navy League in the intimations that the league is boosting for the munitions works and the steel companies. "All I need to say is that is false," he said. "Steel, yes, certainly. I confess to three steel bonds myself. I would to God I had more."

Attacking Josephus Daniels for misusing his admiral's rank, who has a real technical knowledge of the navy, and speaking for the navy side only, the general knowledge that any well-read man can get, he said: "If Wilson is defeated for the presidency this fall one result will be Josephus Daniels. If he insists upon keeping him at the head of the navy, and if it looks as though we would have Daniels for sometime, then Mr. Wilson will probably be defeated. Another reason will be his unfortunate phrase, 'Too proud to fight.'"

The speaker spoke disapprovingly of the small amounts appropriated for the army and navy, and the ridiculously large sum of \$12,000,000 paid annually in pensions to soldiers of a war fought a half a century ago. "Fully one-half of that is graft," he said. "I wish we could have a public man in congress or somewhere else that had courage enough to stand up and say so. But they have to look out for their votes. As I have no political ambitions, whatever, I will say it for them."

JAPS MAKE WOOLEN CLOTH FOR THE RUSSIAN ARMY

(Correspondence of the Associated Press.) TOKYO, Jan. 26.—Japanese woolen mills have accepted a war order for 2,000,000 yards of woolen cloth for the Russian government for delivery beginning next month and continuing until July. The order amounts to \$3,000,000 yen or about \$2,000,000. It is understood that the Japanese companies have agreed to accept Russian treasury bills in payment, a Japanese banking corporation having promised to discount the bills.

Rev. Mr. Chinlund was born and brought up in Chicago. He was ordained in 1908. He has held a number of important places in the Swedish Lutheran church and is a close friend of Rev. Adolf Holt, former pastor of Immanuel church.

In 1901 he married Miss Alma Swenson and they have one daughter, Ethel Evelyn. Mrs. Chinlund is ill but will arrive in Omaha with her daughter in a few days.

Rev. Mr. Chinlund will preach his first sermon in Immanuel church next Sunday at 10 a. m., in the Swedish language. He will preach also in the evening.

A new policy in regard to the language used at Immanuel church will be inaugurated. The morning service on the last Sunday of each month and the evening service every second Sunday will be in English. Other services will be in Swedish.

MIGRATION OF RATS IS TOO MUCH FOR PETROGRAD

PETROGRAD, Jan. 26.—A migration of rats, estimated at 20,000, surprised the residents of the city a few days ago. The custom house district and the grain markets of Petrograd are infested with innumerable rats, often of large size and great boldness. They go to water usually in the stillest hours of the night in serried ranks. Watchmen who see them in motion take pains to get out of their way as they attack isolated men when in numbers. There are traditions that persons who have tried to interfere with these armies of rats have been overcome and killed and eaten. The last migration was by day and and the route led across the Neva sky prospect. Thousands were cut to pieces by the electric street cars and bands of boys and men killed many others. This daylight migration was no doubt caused by the emptying of the grain bins at the grain market. Supplies have been distributed recently directly from the railway cars to the dealers and larger bakers.

CIGAR TRADE WITH THE PHILIPPINES INCREASES

MANILA, P. I., Jan. 26.—The cigar trade between the Philippines and the United States is growing rapidly. A comparative statement issued by the collector of internal revenue for the periods of January to November, 1914, and 1915, shows an increase in exportations to American consumers of 5,068,499 cigars. During these months of 1914 the total shipments amounted to \$7,972,050 and in 1915 to \$8,980,549.

February was the month of largest increase when 9,130,487 cigars were shipped as against 4,067,703 in 1914. January and March showed small advances. July and September increased about a million each. August 2,000,000, while October fell off over 1,500,000.

LABOR IS AGAINST ALL CONSCRIPTION

Conference at Bristol Holds that Compulsory Service Contrary to Spirit of British Democracy.

ACTION IS NEARLY UNANIMOUS

BRISTOL, England, Jan. 27.—A resolution protesting in the name of the national labor party against adoption of conscription in any form was passed by the labor congress today by a card vote of 1,796,000 against 219,000.
