

f property in Sonora state belonging to Mexicans classed by the de facto Carranza government as "reactionaries" has been ordered in a decree dated Hermosile, January 27, and issued by General P. Clias Calles, military commander.

The property to be seized includes all anches, mines and city property belonging to persons who aided opponents of the constitutionalists, either materially, or morally

The ranches confiscated are to be divided among the people, according to the decree. Mines and city property are to be appraised by government experts. and sold at auction, the proceeds to bedivided, 50 per cent going to public school funds, 25 per cent to a fund for widows and orphans of soldiers and 25 per cent to defray expenses of administering proposed agrarian reforms.


