The wedding trip would be taken in a prairie schooner westward toward the new state of Nebraska, where homesteads could be secured. The young couple would cross the Missouri river on a ferry boat, and, while encamped on the Nebraska side, would be joined by other immigrants with similar intentions to become settlers in this state. They would journey together across the bare prairies over new and rough roads, camp-ing at night in the manner of travelers in the early days by the formation of a stockade with their wagons as a protection against Indian attacks. An Indian attack could be shown in which some of their horses or live stock would be driven away. They would finally reach their destination and enter upon the lives of the early settlers on the homesteads they had selected. Sod houses would be constructed, and with old-fashioned breaking
