CHICAGO GRAIN AND PROVISIONS

Features of the Trading and Closing Prices on Board of Trade.

CHICAGO, Feb. 7.—Extremely heavy selling, some of it said to be to hedro European purchases made in Argentina and Australia, brought about a downward swing of 5%c a bushel today in the wheat market here. Prices closed weak at almost the bottom point reached, with May \$1.27% and July \$1.20%@i.21—a net loss of 2%c0c to 5c.

Corn declined 1% to 1%c and cats 1%c to 2c, while provisions closed 2%c to 5c over Saturday.

Even the chief bull leaders sold out their wheat. One widely known speculator was alone said to have thrown overloard 2,000.000 bushels and there were others who unburdened holdings almost as large.

At first the decline that resulted from the continuous selling was orderly, but after the losses had amounted to Michael and the market broke rapidly. Some support developed when prices were 45c down, but on a moderate rally that ensued the liquidation became of huge proportions until the descent was Tac under the top figures of Saturday and 5%c down as compared with Saturday's finish. Big domestic stocks and a relatively alow export call appeared to be the chief reason for the discouragement of the wheat bulls. The United States visible supply total, which is more than 10,000,000 bushels larger than a year ago, showed a decrease today of only 1,340,000 bushels as against 3,360,000 bushels decrease at the corresponding time last year. Besides primary receipts for the day were heavy and there was gossip that they would soo be substantially enlarged in the northwest.
