For the information of those who have misinformed, or misunderstood the championship title of a city tournament is always given to the team or individual rolling high scratch score whether or not the tournament is a handicap affair.

INSURGENTS FORM NEW AMATEUR BODY

Another Organization Comes Into Existence Following Split at Louisville.

TOWNES HEADS FEDERATION

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Feb. 12.—A new national amateur base ball organization came into existence here today after delegates to the annual meeting of the National Amateur Base Ball Association of America had split into two factions at the morning session. The new body, styling itself the National Amateur Base Ball Federation, elected C. E. Townes of Cleveland, president. It begins operation with a membership of nine cities. Loyal members of the old body at the same time held a meeting in a room adjoining that in which the federation was born, continuing under the name of the National Amateur Base Ball Association of America and elected Balfour Goss of Indianapolis, temporary president, and E. C. Seaton of Chicago was re-elected secretary-treasurer. Ben J. Brumleve, Louisville, was elected first vice president, and J. A. Jeckel, Detroit, second vice president.

Other Officers Named.

Other officers installed by the federation were C. W. Sturr, Cincinnati, first vice president; Rondow Abeken, St. Louis, second vice president, and Thomas Nokes, Johnstown, Pa., secretary-treasurer.

President Townes, appointed a committee of five to draw up a constitution and by-laws and meet March 10 at Cincinnati, where a constitutional convention will be held March 11. The association did not select its next meeting place and President Goss was given until February 22 to say whether he would continue to head the organization. In the event that he retains his office he will designate the time and place for the next meeting.

Today's rupture in relations occurred when certain members who later aligned themselves with the old association disagreed with the rulings of Mr. Townes, who in his capacity of vice president, assumed the chair in the absence of President Patterson of Chicago. When Mr. Townes decided that proxies could not be voted and that delegates have to apply for admission to the association could vote Mr. Seaton resigned his office and left the room. Mr. Goss' withdrawal afterwards as old George Buchel of Louisville, second vice president.

Present at the meeting that organized the new federation were: Henry M. Tufo, W. B. Rickford, Chicago; C. A. Brown, Toledo; R. S. Wombald, Columbus; James Mullarky, C. T. Townes, Cleveland; C. E. Martin, C. W. Sturr, Cincinnati; William App. Frank, A. Reichart, Louisville; Rondowben, Ben St. Louis; Tom Nokes, Johnstown, Pa., and Paul R. Furman, Des Moines.

W. E. Van Dusen, J. A. Jacket, Detroit; Dr. P. M. Selzke, Pittsburgh; E. G. Trautman, Columbus, and George Buchel and Ben J. Brumleve of Louisville, in addition to Goss and Seaton, attended the meeting of the association.

When the two meetings adjourned late today none of the business the meeting of the National Amateur Base Ball Association of America had been called to

consider had been transacted. From the session a new delineation of the amateur player had been expected.
