

### WANT MORE PAY FOR DEPUTY TREASURER

Money Handlers Meeting in Omaha Listen to All Sorts of Candidates Speak.

#### BRYAN AND POLLARD TALK

The county treasurers of the state would like legislation that would give them a chance to get some of the excess commissions of the office for their deputies and help in the office. The law at present limits them pretty strictly on this matter and fixes a schedule of percentages of the collections that are available for the treasurer himself and for his deputies.

It was President Peter McIntosh of the State Association of County Treasurers who brought up at the convention at the court house yesterday, the desirability of legislation that would graduate the available excess commissions so that a proper part of them could go to the deputies when the collections are so large as to make the work of the deputies worth more than they are scheduled to get by law.

President McMahon suggested that the new officers of the association take steps during the ensuing year to get an able legislative committee that will seek satisfactory legislation on this point before the next legislature.

#### No Business of Legislature.

Treasurer William Ure of Omaha said in his judgment the legislature has no business fixing the salaries of a deputy, anyway.

"They should give the treasurer and the county commissioners credit for having sense enough to fix little details like that," he said, "without musing up the statute books with such stuff."

If the county treasurers want to know who to elect as governor of the state this fall, there is no reason why they should not know after this convention closes. They should know something about the candidates for several other offices, also, for they have candidates for various offices scheduled to speak to them.

"The program looks like a printed announcement of the speakers before a political convention," said an observer when he had glanced over the program.

Yesterday afternoon Charles W. Bryan and E. M. Pollard, democrat and republican candidates, respectively, for the nomination for governor, were before the treasurers, speaking on co-operation between city and county, and agriculture, respectively.

A list of candidates to speak today is as follows: John L. Kennedy, C. J. Miles, Judge A. L. Sutton, Charles W. Pool, Walter A. George.

#### Don't Like Mr. Hall.

What is the proper way for the state treasurer to make a requisition for money from the county treasurers was the morning topic.

It makes little difference what they think about it, perhaps, for the supreme court is even now endeavoring to decide on this matter, as County Treasurer William G. Ure of Douglas county has a test case in the court now.

According to the law the state auditor should make a check twice a year of the condition of the books of the various county treasurers, determining thereby just how much from each county is due the state treasury. Then the state treasurer shall send out a regular statement to the treasurer of a given county showing what is due from his county and asking that it be forwarded.

The county treasurers say that State Treasurer Hall has not been doing this thing according to form. "He thinks he can get money from the counties by just sending out a blunderbuss letter about it," said one treasurer, "and we don't think that's the way to do."

Senate Foreign Relations Committee Favorably Reports His Nomination.

### VOTE IS TWELVE TO TWO

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23.—President Wilson's nomination of Henry Prather Fletcher as ambassador to Mexico, opposed by some republican senators, who insist the time is not ripe for assignment of a diplomatic representative to the Carranza government, was reported favorably to the senate today by the foreign relations committee. It will come up at the executive session tomorrow, with administration leaders urging confirmation as soon as possible. The committee vote was 12 to 2. Senators Borah and Smith of Michigan, republicans, being the only members voting negatively, and Senator Lodge, ranking republican member, joining with those favoring confirmation.
