Reports reach the railroad offices hat in a number of localities in the western part of Nebraska seeding has part of the state and over in Wyoming the day started in with temperatures ranging from 45 up to 60 degrees, with sunshine everywhere.

From the central portion of the fate west the ground is said to be n perfect condition for starting the spring work. The frost is pretty well out and the water from the at \$250,000. melted snow has settled away, or run off into the streams and low places.

Throughout eastern Nebraska the cold Tuesday night held the waters back, liowing the streams to recede, and as a result, no flood damages are reported. In many places some of the streams are out of their banks, but not sufficiently high so that the water is not doing any damage

On the Burlington's line across the ountry from Plattsmouth to Ash'and last night a gorge formed in the Platte, near Melia, and threw the water out over the bank and across some of the farm land in the vicinity. It was soon broken up with dynamite, and before norning the water had receded and most of it was back in the channel.

Around Louisville, La Platte and Oreapolis the Platte continues pretty high, but it is not giving the railroads any rouble, aside from the fact that the water is slipping over the grade a little north of the bridges. Dynamiting crews are constantly at work above the bridges and have succeeded in keeping the ice

In the Missouri river, above Florence, the ice shows signs of breaking. The ice is covered with water to a depth of six inches to a foot and is beginning to bulge in the center.

All along the Omaha road between here and Sioux City and across on the branch from Emerson to Norfolk the streams have broken up and most of the ice has run out without doing any damage to track or bridges along the line.
