"I wish we had twice as many rooms," said Manager Joseph Keenan of the Henshaw. "This year's Auto show patronage is the biggest we have ever had." "Judging from our business, this must be the largest and best Auto show Omaha has ever held," said Manager Dick Kitchen of the Paxton hotel, "We have housed capacity crowds every night so far this week."
