NEW YORK. Feb. 23—For a brief period of today's trading, notably in the active first hour, the market hade fair to make further substantial recoveries from its pronounced depression of recent seasons. The gains in that time ranged from one to more than three points in standary affects, with far greater advances in speculative issues.


