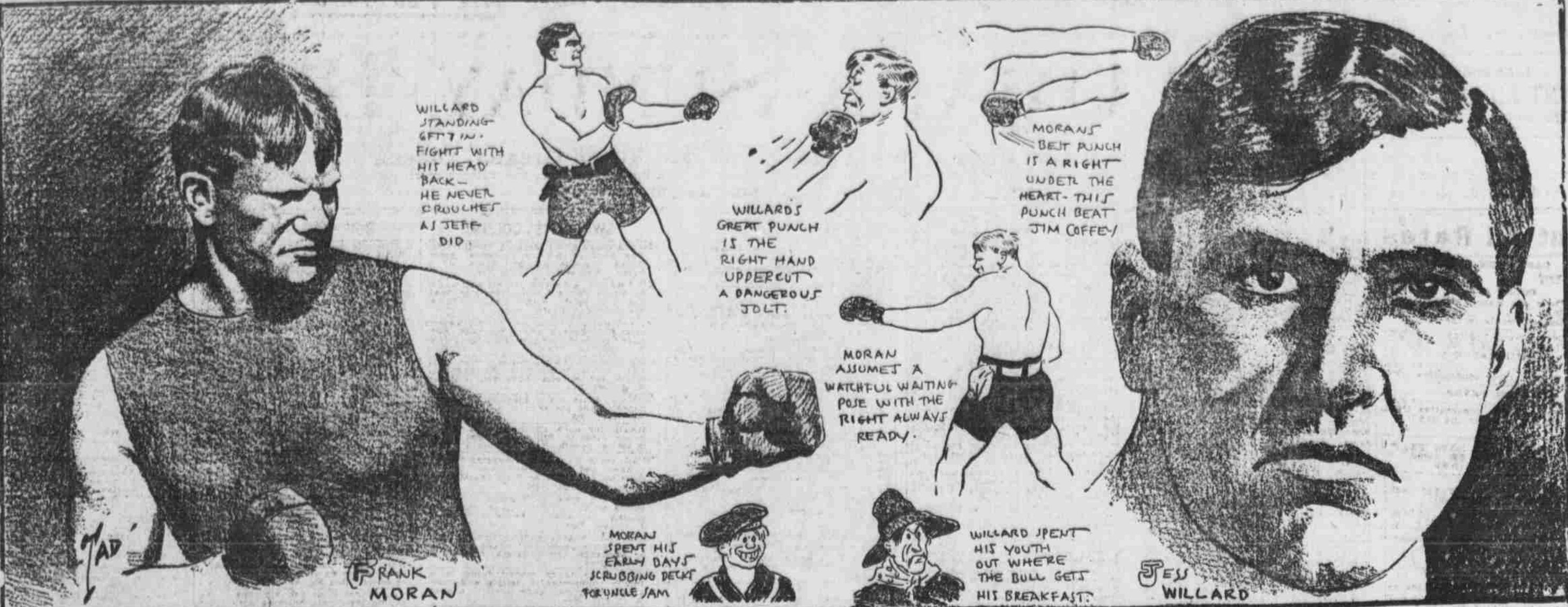


Sizing Them Up

FREMONT NEB., March 4.—(Special Telegram)—The A. B. Sweet Shop girls and the Metz team won their games with a picked team of Fremont girls and Hein's Cubs, winners of fourth place in the handicap tournament at Omaha, in a match here this evening.

The Omaha girls totaled 2,594 against the Fremont girls' 1,848. Miss Lola Nesbit shot high total and high single game for the Omaha team with marks of 223 and 67. Mrs. Jack Dunne, a former Omaha girl, shooting with the Fremont squad, counted 483 in her three games. The Metz team piled up a total of 2,545, winning the first two and tying the last game. Ted Nesbit, with a total of 595, was high for the visitors, while Harry Dunn scored 669 for Hein's Cubs. It was the first match game the Fremont girls ever shot. A big crowd watched the sport. MANAGER GAVE MORAN START

Until last September Ike's only claim to greatness was the fact that he was a mighty good newspaper writer and the brother of T. Aloysius Dorgan, known as Ted. And then fate ruled that Ike should encounter Frank Moran, pugilist, just at a moment when the aforesaid Frank was wearing a woo-begone expression. "Unburden yourself—what's wrong?" commanded the sympathetic Ike.

Moran Relates His Woes.

TRAP SHOOT DATES NAMED

Dates for National Tournaments Are Announced and Several State Tournaments Planned.

LOOK TO GRAND AMERICAN

NEW YORK, March 4.—Preparedness, as far as the trap-shooter is concerned, means getting in trim for the Grand American handicap. This will be held in St. Louis, Mo., in August. Previous to the Grand American there will be sectional championships, and each state in the union which conducts a state championship is eligible to participate in the amateur championship competition in St. Louis. This is about the time of the year that the majority of the state associations make plans for the summer campaign, and already six associations have announced the dates for the annual state tournaments and championship competitions. Other states will fall in line shortly and in another month all the dates should be ready for publication. The southern handicap will take place in Memphis, Tenn., in May; the western in Omaha in June and the eastern in Philadelphia in July. The Pacific coast handicap will be conducted, but the Interstate association has not awarded the event as yet. There's more interest in the sport this year than in any year since trap-shooting really took a hold on the American sports-loving public. Clubs are planning and stiving "booster shoots," and no end of things are being done to make the sectional championships ever bigger than ever. More snap and dash is being displayed by those conducting the state championships and the entry will be repaid in additional entrants. The first championships dates announced are the Mississippi State association. This tournament will be staged on the traps of the Greenville (Miss.) Gun Club, the dates are May 8, 4 and 5. Besides the usual run of events, there will be a three-man team championship, the teams being selected from the best shooters of Alabama, Mississippi, Tennessee, Louisiana and Arkansas. The competition will be known as "the lakes to the Gulf championship." The twenty-sixth running of the Pennsylvania state championship will be staged on the Lansdale, Pa. (Just outside of Philadelphia), traps on May 17, 18, 19 and 20. The original intention was to begin the shoot on May 16, but a primary election that day has caused a change in the plans. In connection with the state shoot there will be sessions of the Pennsylvania State Sportsmen's association in the evening. These should be of great interest to sportsmen, for talks will be made on game, fish and forestry by authorities on the subjects. The Lansdale Board of Trade is as much interested in the shooting tournament as the Lansdale Gun club and is aiding in every way possible. The gun club is campaigning for they expect to double the number of entries in any other state shoot of the year. Men who know their business are handling the shoot. Frank Kamek is chairman of the general committee and his various sub-chairmen are: A. A. Fink of Reading, L. L. Swartz, F. S. Bender and J. B. Rausch. L. R. Lewis is managing the tournament, assisted by Bernard Elieser of York and J. Leon Clark.

YANKS SNARE MINOR STARS

Bill Donovan's Scouts Pick Up Almost All the Leading Minor League Hurlers in Captivity.

TIPPLE'S RECORD IS POOREST

If the scouts sent out by Bill Donovan last season in search of hurling material to help the Yankees in the coming A. L. marathon missed any of the top-notchers in the minor circuits they certainly are hard to find. Of the eleven fingers who will receive tryouts this spring, not one of them failed to win more than half his games. And the Yanks did not go to the Class C circuits. They grabbed most of them from Class AA and Class A. Here's just a sample of what the rookies coming to the Yanks did in the minors last season: Love, a southpaw, pitching in the Coast league, one of the fastest Class-AA circuits, wound up second, giving an average of 1.35 earned runs per game. Piery, from the same circuit, landed fifth with 2.30 earned counts per club. Morgridge was second in the Western, a Class A body, allowing 1.94 earned runs per game. Hildgett was fifth in the same circuit with 2.27. Vance, another Western league, was eighteenth with 2.93. That's quite a collection of classy hurlers and all of them hailing from strong organizations. In fact, from the records of last season, it looks as if Dan Tipple, the much-heralded right-hander from Indianapolis, was the poorest of the lot. Tipple last year pitched 183 innings and was found for seventy-seven earned runs an average of 3.73 per contest. This gave him forty-sixth place among the AA fingers. Besides these and Nick Callup, the former Federal leaguer, Donovan will have Markie and Brady, who finished eleventh and twelfth in the Texas league; Russell from the International and Ross and Shocker from the Canadian.
