ALCOHOL BAD FOR BABIES HOUSE VOTES FOR

Dr. J. M. Aikin Advises Mothers to Refrain from Drinking Liquor.

GENIUS HIGH CLASS DEGENERATE

"Don't drink beer, mait or other alco holica" was Dr. J. M. Aikin's advice to nursing mothers given at the baby health exhibit Thursday evening. "The practice of drinking beer and malt is due to an erroneous assumption that it increases the quantity of milk. Beer and malt are not food. If the quantity of milk is increased, you can be sure the quality is decreased," he asserted.

The slightly intoxicated husband is a greater menace to his future child than le the continual "sop," according to Dr. Aikin. "It is the man who drinks, but never gets drunk, the moderate drinker, whose nervous system is deteriorated and who is physically unable to resist any illness. Not only is he a prey to all illnesses, but alcoholism is a handicap towards his recovery. Physicians dislike to treat such a patient because he has no resistance. If it is lung trouble, the physician is ready to write the death certificate.

"If there was no alcoholism, the white plague would be wiped out in four generations," said Dr. Aikin. The evils of cigaret smoking were also enlarged upon by the speaker. "The effects of cigaret smoking are more quickly apparent than alcohol. Great geniuses are high-class degener-

ates, according to Dr. Aikin, who is a specialist for nervous and mental diseases. "In musical or literary geniuses this one phase is developed at the expense of every othr side of their make-up," he

Republicans Attack Underwood-Simmons Law in Reply to Kitchin.

CANNON LAUDS ALDRICH ACT

WASHINGTON, March 17 .- With thirteen democrats and the one socialist member opposing the house today by a vote of 346 to 14 passed the administration bill to retain the present tariff of 1 cent a pound on sugar instead of permitting the free clause of the Underwood-Simmons tariff act to go into effect May 1. next. The measure now goes to the senate.

Voting against the bill were Representatives Bailey of Pennsylvania; Buchanan, Sabath, McAndrews and Tavenner of Illinois, Callaway of Texas, Crosser and Gordon of Ohio, Hilliard of Colorado, Howard of Georgia, Johnson of Kentucky. Thompson of Oklahoma and Vandyke of Minnesota, democrats, and London of New York, socialist.

Majority Leader Kitchin took the floor to close the argument. It was one of the few times Mr. Kitchin has appeared for an administration measure during the session. A rapid exchange resolved itself into a general assault upon and defense of the entire Underwood-Simmons tariff act. Opening with the declaration that the republican party was the original free sugar organization in the United States and quoting from congressional records and campaign books of the early '90s to prove his assertions, the majority leader drew attacks from former Speaker Cannon and other republicans.

The sole cause for the proposed repeal of the free sugar clause, Mr. Kitchin said, was that imports had fallen off, due to the European war, making the sugar taxes necessary to meet the expense of the government. Incidentally he declared the democratic party never had committed itself to a free sugar act for

"I have heard a great many people deneunce the Underwood act, but I have not heard a solitary, single republican defend the Payne-Aldrich law," he added "The Payne-Aldrich tax I approved of then," interrupted Mr. Cannon, "and I have never apologized for it since, and would to God it were on the statute books

"Then you are repudiating the platform of the republican party in 1812," Kitchin replied, "as you promised to recut down."
