Anton Schaefer entertained about twenty of his friends and relatives at his home Sunday in honor of his 71st birthday anniversary.

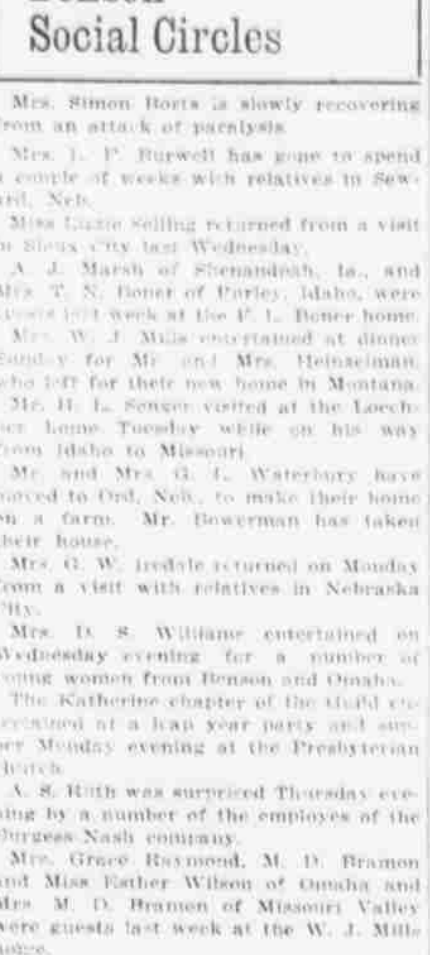

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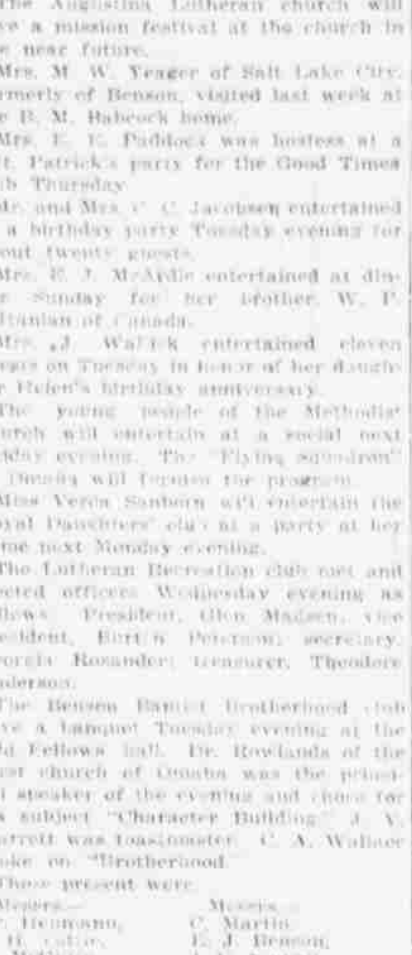
