HOGS-The hog supply, while hardly as large as yeaterday, was of very fair proportions, 20 cars, or some 1,800 head being reported in. So far this week arrivals have been 40,674 head, being 1,000 short of last week, but 6,000 heavier than two weeks ago and a gain of 4,500 over the corresponding days a year ago. On early rounds practically all buyers were willing to give steady prices for anything good, but other markets were reporting slightly stronger values and sellers wanted at least a nickel above yesterday. Both the packers and shippers were alow about getting down to business, but shippers finally started the ball rolling, buying some of the mixed hogs on a strong to 3c higher basis, and packers soon got in on about the same basis.

Actual trading began quite a little earlier than it did yesterday, but movement was less lively than on Tuesday. The market gave the idea that it was threatening to weaken at any moment, and this was perfectly true, for long before a clearance was made prices dropped back to a steady basis. Light hogs, unless they were good enough to attracts shippers, had been hard to get action on all morning, and while some sellers were fortunate enough to get rid of their underweights at prices that were steady to strong, many were passed up. The result was that when packer buyers began to leave the yards there were still twenty-five or more loads, mostly on the mixed and light order, still unsold.
