## TAKES FALL OUT OF TREASURER HALL

Rival Democratic Candidate Accuses Him of Failure to Do Duty and Playing Favorites.

WILL NOT ASK SPECIAL LAWS

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Neb., March 24.-(Special.) The congenial spirit which has so far characterized the candidacy of democrats against each other is again shown in a statement issued by Harry Adams of Chadron, democratic candidate for state treasurer, which seeks to antagoerer Hall and "show him up" before the voters. Mr. Adams says:

The man who is elected to serve all the people of this state and then after election straightway turns his back upon their expense should not ask for their expense should not ask for their suffrage a second time. That is my contention and I have that in mind in seeking to obtain from the present state treasurer the democratic nomination for that office.

tention and I have that in mind in seeking to obtain from the present state treasurer the democratic nomination for that office.

I want it understood by those whose suffrage I ask that if nominated and chosen for the state treasurership I will think of the people first and my political welfare second in the administration of the office.

I want to be specific in this, if elected I will work with all departments of this state for the best good of the state. It will not be my purpose to erippie any department, sorely needed by the state, in order to increase what I believe to be my political standing. I will use my judgment as I believe the people would have me use it in administering this office. I will act upon all the boards of which I am a member by law for the best interests of the taxpayers, even to the reduction of the state's taxes where it is possible to do so.

It will not be necessary for the courts of the state to be resorted to to make me do my palpable duty. I shall not ask the taxpayers to foot expense bills connected with my administration because I intend, if I am elected, to see that my office is conducted in the way the people manifestic want it conducted. I shall not allow my political whims to govern me in the distribution of public deposit moneys, and I shall not share use cent's worth in the premium on the writing of my bond.

I shall not endeavor to influence the legislature in the enactment of any laws designed to give me more arbitrary power in the conduct of the affairs of my office. I shall endeavor to be the servant of all the people rather than the autocrat over those with whose money I have been entrusted.

These are plain points of difference between my opponent and myself. His vecord is known to all voters, who want to inform themselves upon it. I insist that he has not run the office as he should have run it and I am willing to long the point of administration they desire to see put into effect for the next two years.
