

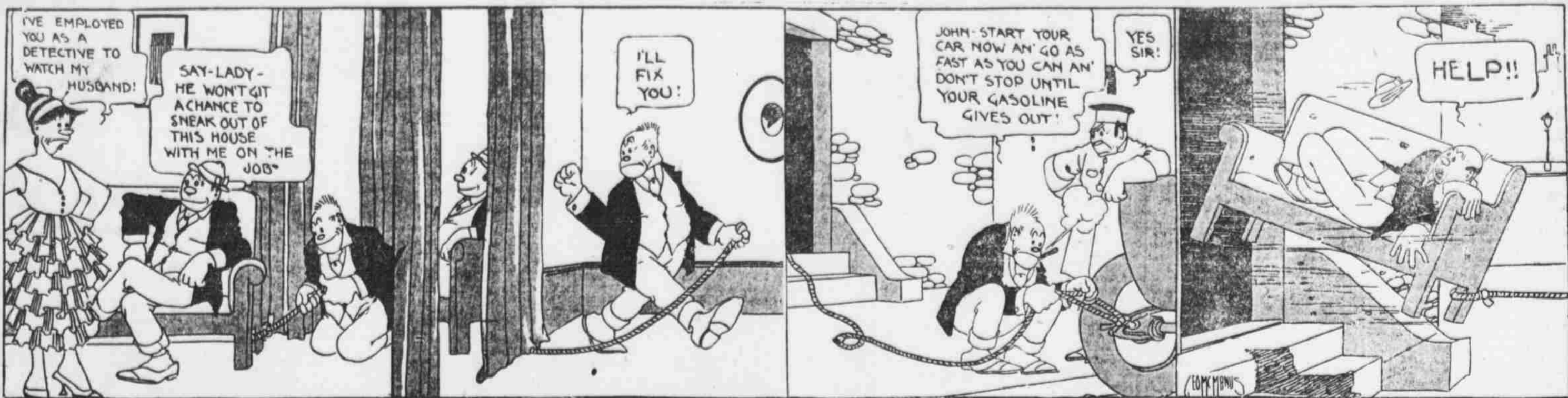

SIoux WARRIORS COME TRAILING IN

Eleven Men Already at Beatrice and Eleven More Are on the Way.

GASPAR HAS HIGH HOPES

FAIRBURY, Neb., March 31.—(Special Telegram.)—Harry Gaspar and eleven of his prospective players commenced active training at the city park ball diamond today and eleven more players are expected to arrive in the city from the east before tomorrow.

Among the arrivals of the Sioux City tribe last night were Pat Livingston of Cleveland, Ohio. Livingston did not play ball last year, but has done his uniform and is in the game to stay this year. He formerly played with the Athletics. Al Furschner, who played with the Sioux City team four years ago, is trying to land a berth with his old love and is here staged out in a uniform.

George Naughton, who played with Kansas City last year, is trying to get his name on the payroll of the Sioux. He hails from Sioux City. Connie Callister, Boston, the Sioux City shortstop of last year, is again on deck. Pitcher Bernie Doyle is in the city and getting his arm in shape. He registers from Peoria, Ill. Outfielder Gene Cosgrove showed up last night and will try to land his old position in the outfield.

C. R. Clark, familiarly known as "Pep" is another pitcher enrolled with the Sioux at this point. Messrs. Roy French, T. E. Connelly and L. M. Francis, the trio who have been in the city for several days, are giving the other ball players a warm welcome.

Manager Harry Gaspar is decked out in a uniform and took time to say, "I expect to put the Sioux City warriors through strenuous practice each day. We will work out five and six hours practicing twice a day."

"At present we have five holdouts on the club, that is men who have not signed up at present.

"The practice will consist of batting, pitching and different work to develop the players. We have an exhibition game staged for Omaha for a week from yesterday, April 6, to be played here. Then we will go to Beatrice for exhibition games on Friday and Saturday. Omaha will come over here Sunday and Monday. "We expect to put in three weeks of good training at this point."

Goltz Says Tauscher to Furnish Dynamite to Blow Up the Canal

WASHINGTON, March 31.—Department of Justice officials announced today that two alleged conspirators with Captain Hans Tauscher in the plot to blow up the Welland canal were under arrest in New York, that a third was under surveillance in New England and that they expected to arrest a fourth in a few days.

Among the additional arrests announced today was that of a man who gave the name of Tucker. He was taken into custody in El Paso two weeks ago and later taken to New York. The alleged conspirators are said to have planned an invasion of Canada to be made at a point west of the Great Lakes.

According to the story told department agents by Horst von der Goltz, the alleged German spy brought to New York by Scotland Yard detective last Tuesday, the plan to blow up the Welland canal was known to Captain von Papez, the withdrawn German military attaché, who furnished money for the work.

Von der Goltz was quoted as saying that von Papez had proposed the Welland canal proposal after it had been decided that it would be impossible to lead a large armed expedition into Canada from the United States. Von der Goltz had sought to enlist Germans in Baltimore, Hoboken and New York and department agents say he declared he was acting with the knowledge of von Papez.

In July, 1911, from Mexico, where he had been on General Villa's staff, and reported to von Papez. The plan to invade Canada, he told department agents, had been his, not von Papez's.

After a time, von der Goltz said, the plan was abandoned. The intended point of invasion, officials said, was "west of the Great Lakes." The force which von der Goltz wanted to raise for the expedition was to be sufficiently large to engage the attention of the troops which Canada was training to send to Europe.
