LINCOLN IS MAGNET FOR STATE BOWLERS

Pin Tumblers Gathering at Capital City for State Tournament Which Opens Monday.

FORTY TEAMS ARE ENTERED

The next big event carded for the bowlers is the Nebraska State tournament, which opens in Lincoln this evening. Secretary Buffum has announced an entry of forty teams with a proportionate number of doubles and singles, coming from several towns in the state. Omaha, Lincoln, Fremont, Grand Island, Columbia, Wahoo, Schuyler, Pender and other towns are well represented with their best teams and competition for state honors is sure to be keen. Lincoln bowlers have extended themselves and have secured a large local entry to boost the prize list, which will be around the thousand-dollar mark.

Plenty of Entertainment.

In addition to this they will stage a classy brand of entertainment for the visitors during their stay. Their alleys have been refinished and placed in condition, so that all entrants will receive an even break.

Omaha bowlers have entered ten strong teams, which is about five teams short of the number expected. These teams include the best in the city and are due to bring home a big slice of the prize money. Most of them will roll on Saturday night, which is "Omaha Night."

The Garlow Colts, present city champions; Luxus, Pete Luchs, Clara Belle, Metz, Hotel Castles, Lewis Buffets and Old Bowlers Home will roll on this night. The Omaha Jetties Old Age will roll on Friday night. Doubles and singles will be rolled on the same days.

Fremont Wants Next Meet.

Fremont will bid for the next meeting, and will lead it, unless Lincoln should want it again or Grand Island bowlers should bid for it. Fremont is centrally located, has a first-class set of alleys and has a good chance. The annual state meeting will be held on Sunday, April 8. The Farnam handicap tournament will be held from April 10 to 18. A handicap system with a 100 scratch and a 150 minimum will be used. All matches will be rolled across six alleys. The tournament is open to everybody. The entry fee will be \$1.50 per man in the team event and \$1.00 per man in the doubles and singles, including all bowling charges. An additional fee in the all-events will be charged, this amount being split up in three prizes, \$5, \$3 and \$2 per cent. Entries close April 10. All entries should be handed to K. G. Reipke, secretary of the tournament.

Prize money checks covering Omaha bowlers' winnings in the American Bowling Congress at Toledo, were received Saturday. Several fared well, especially Wartschow and Cochran, who are up around the hundred-dollar mark.
